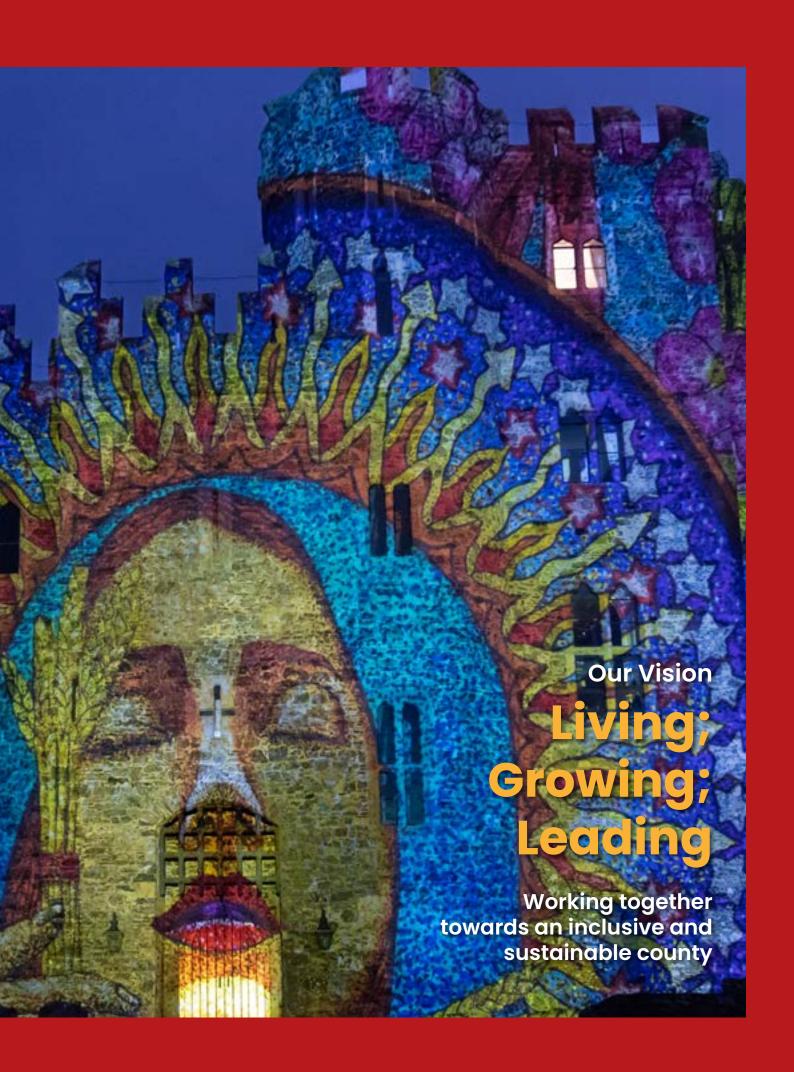

Joint Foreword

Sonya Kavanagh, Chief Executive, Kildare County Council & Councillor Fintan Brett, Cathaoirleach of the County of Kildare

Our Annual Report 2022 gives us an opportunity to reflect on the activities and achievements of Kildare County Council. It highlights the wide range of services that the council provides in Kildare across all aspects of daily life.

Many significant and important projects and milestones advanced throughout 2022.

Kildare County Council was proud to launch 'Brigid 1500' a programme of national and international events and initiatives to celebrate and commemorate St Brigid, the woman, the life and the legacy. Kildare Council Council, supported by an expert steering committee aims to deliver a meaningful cultural and societal legacy as we build towards the major Brigid 1500 festival in 2024, which marks the 1500th anniversary of the death of St Brigid. Watch this space!

The Kildare County Development Plan 2023 – 2029 was adopted in 2022. Consultation and engagement was at the centre of this significant and involved process for the elected members and staff of Kildare County Council. The County Develop-

ment Plan sets out our strategy to coordinate and prioritise areas of population growth and address the physical, social and environmental needs of the county in delivering new development and enhancing and safeguarding our valued assets and amenities.

The first sod was turned to commence works on the much sought after Athy Distributor Road project in early 2022. Upon completion it will include the provision of two new roundabouts, new signalised cross-roads junctions as well as extended areas of footpath and cycleways. The project will alleviate traffic congestion and create a safer travel environment in Athy.

Significant progress has been made on housing delivery in the county. 372 new homes were delivered by Kildare County Council and Approved Housing Bodies.

Continuing our climate action initiatives, 178 properties were upgraded under the Energy Retrofit Programme.

Kildare County Council worked in support of national government to provide accommodation for people fleeing from the war in Ukraine. A Rest Centre was established for those arriving. 107 pledges of accommodation were assessed by the council and subsequently commenced providing accommodation.

Community supports and integration were also a priority for Kildare County Council to support those displaced by the war, and our communities. The Kildare Community Response Forum was reformed to coordinate and provide much needed supports.

The Healthy Kildare Plan 2022 – 2026 was launched, providing over €427,298 in funding for projects which engaged over 5,500 people.

978 community grants were distributed providing funding of €1,956,003.

Kildare County Council continued the programme of works to improve and add to the existing parks and open spaces across the county. Including the addition of accessible facilities at People's Park. Design, planning, consultation and tender progress was made on other playgrounds including Allenwood and Leixlip.

The construction of Kerdiffstown Park continued at pace throughout 2022. We look forward to launching this exciting multi-use recreational amenity soon for the surrounding communities and visitors alike.

Our Sustainable Energy Communities were reinvigorated in their efforts in 2022 through a series of workshops as well as significant progress on plans for applications for SEAI grand funding to retrofit homes, commercial and potentially community buildings.



The County Development Plan aims to focus on the physical, social and environmental needs of the county.

Elected members have demonstrated great leadership and commitment and continue to focus on our people, our communities, our environment and our economic development.

Kildare County Council strives to innovate and be agile in our approach to service delivery, maximising our resources, continually improving our customer service and communication, citizen engagement and social inclusion. We hope this was evident across all aspects of Kildare County Council in 2022.

Overview of 2022:

Over €5.4m in Local Property Tax funding was allocated in 2022 to the 5 Municipal Districts across the county, which contributed to the development and delivery of hundreds of community projects, environmental initiatives and county maintenance as well as creative and cultural programmes. Local Property Tax is an annual tax on residential properties, based on their market value and the allocation of this funding on an annual basis by Kildare County Council contributes to the quality of life and infrastructure for the citizens of Kildare across the 5 Municipal District Areas of the county.

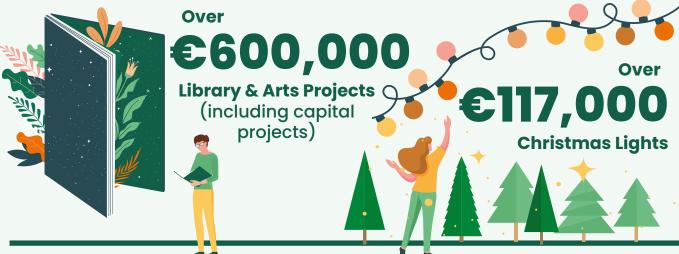


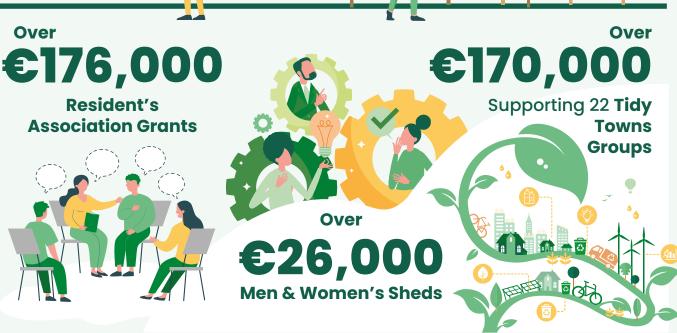

Community

Overview of 2022:

Community

 Kildare County Council welcomed the return to in-person projects and programmes in 2022 allowing community stakeholders to reconnect after a particularly difficult period

- → The outbreak of the war in Ukraine posed sudden and unexpected challenges to our communities. The Community Emergency Response Forum re-established with a focus to share information and build communications channels
- → 978 grants supported
- → Provided funding of €1,958,003
- Continued supporting communities to identify, develop and implement projects to improve quality of life in the county

Overview of 2022 continued:



Brigid 1500

- → Brigid 1500 was launched in November 2022
- → A two-year cultural programme to celebrate St. Brigid, the Woman, the Life and the legacy
- → A steering committee with oversight for the programme was formed
- → A Brigid 1500 co-ordinator was appointed with the primary role to oversee the planning and delivery of Brigid 1500 events
- → Several community groups and local artists were supported by the Brigid 1500 grant scheme which was launched in late 2022

Local Community Development Committees (LCDC)

- The social inclusion programme SICAP (Social Inclusion and Community Activation Programme), overseen by Kildare LCDC, worked with 73 community groups and 878 individuals with a budget of €1,357,382
- → Sixteen projects were approved at the LCDC/ Local Action Group (LAG) to a value of €930,922.38 under the Rural Development Leader Programme

- Under the Community Activities Funding 2022, €296,027 allocated from the Department of Rural and Community Development was awarded to 104 community and voluntary groups, to support their running, capital and equipment costs
- → A Slaintecare Development Officer was appointed in March 2022, the Slaintecare (Athy) programme was launched in October 2022, a Local Implementation Group involving key community stakeholders was also established
- → Works under the Community Enhancement Fund were completed and funding of €75,000 allocated to projects that promoted health and wellbeing
- → The Healthy Kildare Plan 2022-2026 was launched
- → Healthy Ireland in Kildare closed out Round 3 (€427,298.82) and implemented an interim fund. Healthy Ireland funded programmes have engaged over 5,500 people

Kildare Sports Partnership

Kildare Sports Partnership engaged with over 17,000 people in Kildare and continued to support groups and a number of programmes including:

- → Sports Inclusion Disability Programme 959 participants over 15 programmes
- → Schools/Youths Programme 7,553 participants over 10 programmes
- → Community Based Programmes 4,298 participants over 11 programmes
- → Education and Training Programme 953 participants over 9 programmes
- → Women in Sport Programme 575 participants over 8 programmes
- → Sport Hub Programme 870 participants over 6 programmes
- → Age Friendly Programme 665 participants over 4 programmes
- → Get Kildare Walking Programme 758 participants over 4 programmes
- → Ukrainian Refugee Support Programme 390 participants

Playgrounds and Parks

Continued programme of works to improve and add to the existing Parks and Open Spaces. Highlights included:

- Upgrade of The People's Park included resurfacing of paths and the creation of new paths to facilitate a looped walk. New accessible seating and picnic tables were installed
- → Sallins Amenity Land progressed to completion of a Part 8 Masterplan which will be the basis for developing the land for amenity purposes
- → Tree Works Programme included the completion of tree pruning, removals and planting across the county
- Allenwood Playground progressed to tender prepared for the construction of the playground
- → Leixlip Playground underwent a design process to relocate the playground within Leixlip Amenities Centre and redesign the car parking to facilitate the relocation
- Celbridge Outdoor Youth Facilities project saw Dublin City University contracted to undertake consultation with young people in Celbridge in relation to the provision of outdoor facilities. The results of this will be used to inform what type of facilities will be provided
- Work on cycle parking in St Catherine's Park and a brochure on canal trails in the county were completed
- Work began on the provision of an improved walking and cycling connection to Moore Abbey Woods
- → Feasibility study commenced for the development of a looped walking and cycling route for Old Kilcullen, this work is being funded by grants received under the Outdoor Recreational and Infrastructure Scheme which is funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development

Community Development

- → The community development team continued to provide community development support in the county with a particular emphasis on disadvantaged communities
- The development plan prioritised society re-engaging after covid lockdowns and the Ukrainian response
- → International Women's Day Health Fair, held in Newbridge Town Hall, was opened by Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly TD
- → Three groups were nominated and supported to enter the IPB Local and National Pride of Place Awards, and Kildare County Council were delighted to announce Liffey Linear Park winning a special award in the 'Creative Places' category and Narraghmore were Runners up in the 'Village with a Population of 300 1,000' category
- → The Pride in your Place competition continued in 2022 and acknowledges the efforts of local authority residents and residents' associations to develop their communities, maintain individual gardens and public open spaces. New categories were introduced, which included Climate Action Projects and Age Friendly Projects

Kildare Age Friendly Programme

- A new information booklet aimed at Kildare's older citizens which contains useful information on self-care, age-friendly activities, healthy eating and more was launched
- → The Kildare Age Friendly strategy consultation took place in preparation for the launch in 2023
- Other age friendly projects included walkability audits in Ballymore Eustace and the completion of works to make Celbridge an age friendly town

Twinning

- The Kildare-Lexington Student Exchange Programme recommenced in 2022
- → 12 Kildare secondary students travelled to Lexington, Kentucky where they spent ten nights with their host families enjoying a busy programme of activities
- Their US counter parts made a return visit to Kildare where their itinerary included visits to major tourist attractions around the county

Enterprise & Economic Development

Overview of 2022:

- → €4.2 million secured to deliver on Athy Food,
 Drink & Skills Innovation Hub under the Rural
 Regeneration and Development Fund. When
 complete, the hub will act as a home for our
 county-wide food cluster and will provide
 manufacturing space for 20 entrepreneurs. It
 will also act as an education hub for the approx.
 100 youth in the area to upskill and access the
 job market each year
- → €250,000 funding approved under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme to purchase a vacant building for the purpose of refurbishing it as a co-working and remote working hub for Monasterevin and the surrounding area. Following a successful bid and contract exchange, Kildare County Council have purchased the vacant Bank of Ireland building in Monasterevin

Overview of 2022 continued:

→ Athy confirmed as one of 26 towns in Ireland selected to receive up to €100,000 in funding as part of the Streetscape Enhancement Scheme 2022 – 2023. Under the Streetscape Enhancement initiative, retailers, property owners and local groups can apply for grants that they can use to improve the facades of their buildings, carry out artwork or install features such as street furniture or canopies. Over 20 applicants expressed an interest in applying for funding

- → To support businesses in Naas town, Into Kildare and Punchestown Racecourse collaborated on 'Paint the Town Red' to encourage racegoers to visit and experience the town pre and post racing during the Punchestown Festival
- → As part of the continuing Thoroughbred Country partnership, Into Kildare met with Tipperary Tourism to discuss the collaborative actions in the Thoroughbred Country Destination Experience Plan and support on the steering committee
- → Into Kildare hosted the inaugural networking and education event for Tourism Ambassadors and County Council officers from around Ireland. It was an opportunity to share ideas and identify areas and projects for collaboration, in particular Brigid 1500, Greenways & Blueways and cross border promotion
- → The first twinning network meeting took place since 2019. In addition to the three twinning committees there was also representation from the County Twinning Committee. Into Kildare presented on diaspora and twinning activity that was carried out over the last two years including St Brigid's Day, St Patrick's Day and Taste of Kildare at Christmas. Into Kildare welcomed County twinning partner Lexington to Co. Kildare

Overview of 2022 continued:

- → In collaboration with Fáilte Ireland, Into Kildare attended the Fáilte Ireland Golf Tourism Convention and met with over 50 leading international golf tour operators. Face-to-face meetings took place with operators for the US, Canada, Great Britain, Germany and the Netherlands
- → At the All-Ireland Community & Council Awards, the Royal Canal Greenway named Best Tourism Initiative 2021. The Award, sponsored by Fáilte Ireland in collaboration with the state agencies and County Councils, seeks to recognise an initiative which directly increases visitor numbers to an area, or to Ireland as a whole and positively impacts visitors, communities and existing businesses as well as creating new business opportunities
- Into Kildare Green Oak Leaf initiative was launched, which encourages tourism and hospitality providers across the county to make sustainable changes in their business. Those who are making efforts to be more eco-friendly and are members of sustainable programs will have the Into Kildare Green Oak Leaf embedded on their intokildare.ie website listing

 - Naas Library & Cultural Centre, URDF funded refurbishment and extension to Naas Town Hall has progressed throughout 2022
 - County Library, Local Studies and Archives worked with the Design Team and Public Realm to finalise plans in preparation for Part 8 submission
 - Finalised plans in preparation for Part 8 consultation for Clane Library
 - Announcement of Kildare County Council's plans to purchase Celbridge Parochial House and lands for the development of a new library and recreational facilities for Celbridge

- The Library Service Ukrainian response included the purchase of stock in both Russian and Ukrainian, online resources, events, welcome mornings, English classes; particularly in Newbridge, Maynooth, Athy and Celbridge. The library staff also ensured translation of library information resources and contributed to the Ukrainian Information portal on the Kildare County Council website
- The formal unveiling of the Squires Gannon sculpture commission took place on Sunday 25th September in the Market Square, Kildare. Guests included Leas Cathaoirleach Joe Neville, President of the GAA Larry Mc Carthy, Towers GAA club, the artist Mark Richards FRSS, members of William (Bill) Gannon's family, and the All-Ireland winning captain of the Kildare U14 girls team 2022, Katie Ray. Overview of 2022:

- Naas topped the rankings in the IBAL litter league for the 2nd year in a row
- 136 groups and individuals participated in the Green Kilometre initiative in 2022, resulting in over 800 native saplings provided to participants to improve local biodiversity
- 131 schools registered for the green schools programme working on environmental themes including litter and waste, energy and water reduction, biodiversity and sustainable travel

Kerdiffstown Park

- Construction of Kerdiffstown Park progressed at pace. When complete it will provide an exciting multi-use recreational amenity as well as economic and environmental benefits to the wider community. Facilities include:
 - Walking routes

 - Playground facilities

Overview of 2022 continued:

Morrell Flood Relief Scheme

- The Morell Flood Management Scheme is under construction to protect households, businesses and other amenities and local roads in the catchment which are at risk from flooding
- Works complete in 2022 comprised of 150.5m of channel diversion works, 2,249m of flood defence embankments constructed, 450m of flood defence walls constructed and 551m of embankment remediation works

Climate Action Office

- Kildare County Council's Climate Action Office in conjunction with Green Generation is undertaking the 'Grass to Gas' project exploring the circular economy. This is providing positive and steady results which we hope will impact positively on our ability to provide indigenous renewable natural gas for council applications such as fuelling for heavy goods vehicles
- Our Sustainable Energy Communities were reinvigorated in their efforts in 2022 through workshops facilitated by the Energy Team, Dunleer as well as progress on plans for applications for SEAI grand funding to retrofit homes, commercial and potentially community buildings

Housing

Supporting delivery of housing and associated community development.

To work with all partners to strive to meet Kildare's housing needs, working to reduce homelessness and providing support for developing communities.

Overview of 2022:

- 372 new homes were delivered by Kildare County Council and Approved Housing Bodies, achieving Housing for All build targets
- 261 new homes were delivered through the social leasing programme
- → 261 new homes and 2,032 households received Housing Assistance Payment
- → An affordable housing team was established and Affordable Housing Scheme was adopted
- 5 compulsory purchase orders were issued to address vacancy and deliver on Town Centre First Objectives
- → Commenced participation in the Croí Cónaithe initiative, 22 Croí Cónaithe applications received in 2022
- Expenditure on the grants programme increased from €4.25 million in 2021 to €5.19 million in 2022
- → 61 council owned properties were adapted for persons with a disability and 627 grants approved for private households

Overview of 2022 continued:

- → Kildare County Council supported the provision of 40 hostel beds, 24 Cold Weather Beds, 8 Shared Tenancies for single persons and 16 Housing First Tenancies created, in accordance with objectives if the Mid East Region Homeless Action Plan
- Kildare County Council continued to provide a high-quality maintenance service to tenants and continued the programme of property upgrades
- → 178 properties were upgraded under the Energy Retrofit Programme, progressing our climate action initiatives
- A Rest Centre was established to provide accommodation for people fleeing the war in Ukraine

- Signage was erected in 4 of the 5 Municipal Districts regarding Bye Laws controlling consumption and possession of alcohol in public places
- → Kildare County Council was the recipient of the inaugural Communications Award at the Excellence in Local Government Awards 2022 for the campaign titled 'Understanding Kildare's County Development Plan' which aimed to provide a better understanding of the County Development Plan and the process involved in its development
- An app for all Kildare County Council employees was launched providing up to date information and resources whether staff are working on the move, on site or at the desk, helping to stay connected
- Comprehensive and accessible service provided to 40 elected members of Kildare County Council across 5 Municipal Districts

- All requests from members for attendance at conference and training requests were organised throughout 2022

Overview of 2022:

- → Kildare County Council engaged in public consultation to review the existing Kildare County Development Plan 2017-2023 and to prepare a new County Development Plan for the period 2023-2029. Consultation and engagement were at the centre of this significant and involved process for the elected members and staff of Kildare County Council
- Kildare County Development Plan 2023-2029 was adopted on 9th December. The County Development Plan sets out our strategy to coordinate and prioritise areas of population growth and address the physical, social and environmental needs of the county in delivering new development and enhancing and safeguarding our valued assets and amenities
- On 17th December 2021 the Strategic Housing Application (SHD) process which involved large developments in excess of 100 housing units was redeployed to the Local Authority Sector in the form of Large-scale Residential Developments (LRD). New processes were developed to deal with these types of applications which operate within very stringent parameters
- Work commenced on the Maynooth Local Area Plan, with various assessments including the preparation of a Transport Strategy
- Work commenced on the Kildare Town Local Area Plan, including the preparation of various environmental and infrastructural assessments
- The Kildare Development Contribution Scheme was reviewed, the new scheme was formally adopted on 19th December 2022
- Monasterevin Town Renewal Masterplan was launched. The project received funding of €40,000 under the Town & Village Accelerated Covid Measures Scheme to develop the outdoor space during the pandemic, the success of which has led to RRDF funding approval for the permanent redevelopment of the square

Overview of 2022 continued:

- Kildare County Council secured a lease on the Potato Market, Naas as part of a heritage led regeneration project under the Historic Towns Initiative. This is the initial part of a 2-phase development and includes essential stabilisation, conservation and repair works to the historic stone walls, new ground surface, toilets & temporary lighting. It is initially being used for the Farmer's Market, but over time it is expected to become an important venue for community and cultural events and an outdoor performance space.
- Phase 2 of the successful community-led social enterprise at The Old Hardware was launched, the initial development of which was funded by the Town & Village Renewal Scheme

- Branding for the proposed Shackleton Museum and Emily Square project was unveiled by Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, and further development of the Rural Regeneration and Development funded project was achieved
- Significant progress was achieved on the Barrow Blueway project, including the official ribbon cutting on the completion of the first 5km of the Barrow Blueway at Lowtown. The project is being delivered in partnership between Kildare County Council, Waterways Ireland and Laois County Council through the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund

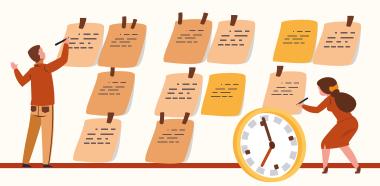

Overview of 2022:

- → Kildare County Council welcomed Minister of State at the Department of Transport, Hildegarde Naughton TD and Minister of State, Martin Heydon TD to Athy for an official sod turning event to mark the commencement of works on the new Athy Distributor Road. Upon completion, works will include the provision of two new roundabouts, new signalised crossroads junctions, approx. 3.4km of footpath and cycleway as well as the construction of an 80m single span steel bridge over the River Barrow
- The main contract was awarded for the construction of a new Machinery Yard and Regional Salt Barn and work has commenced on site
- Ongoing progression of significant capital projects including Maynooth Eastern Ring Road, Celbridge to Hazelhatch Link Road, Newhall Junction upgrade and junction improvement programme
- The development of Maynooth and Newbridge Transport Strategies are ongoing

Overview of 2022 continued:

- → Sustainable Transport: The highest drawdown of NTA funding to date at €9.7M. Over 30 schemes being progressed with five Part 8 public consultation processes completed and the continued delivery of cycle routes and greenway active travel projects throughout the county
- → Construction of Active Travel Schemes: Commenced construction of Greenway between Maynooth and Leixlip with an 18-month construction programme. Contracts were signed in December for the Kilcullen Road Active Travel Scheme in Naas
- → Surface dressing and road restoration on 170km of local and regional roads was completed across 130 different locations at a cost of €14.7 million
- Winter salting carried out over 10 routes covering 688km of regional and local roads on 80 separate occasions
- A fully accessible Changing Places facility for people with complex disabilities was opened at Aras Chill Dara including many features and additional equipment making it more accessible than standard accessible toilets. Works on a second facility in progress for Newbridge Sports Centre

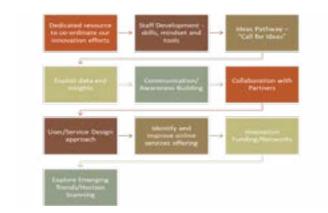

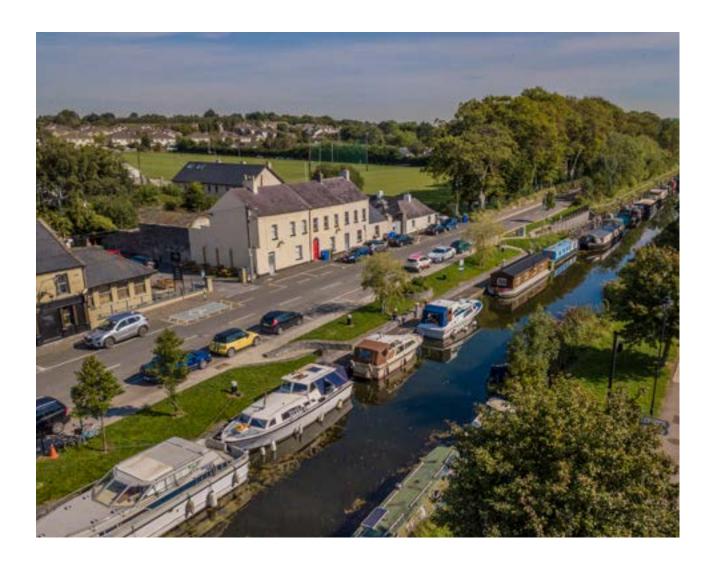

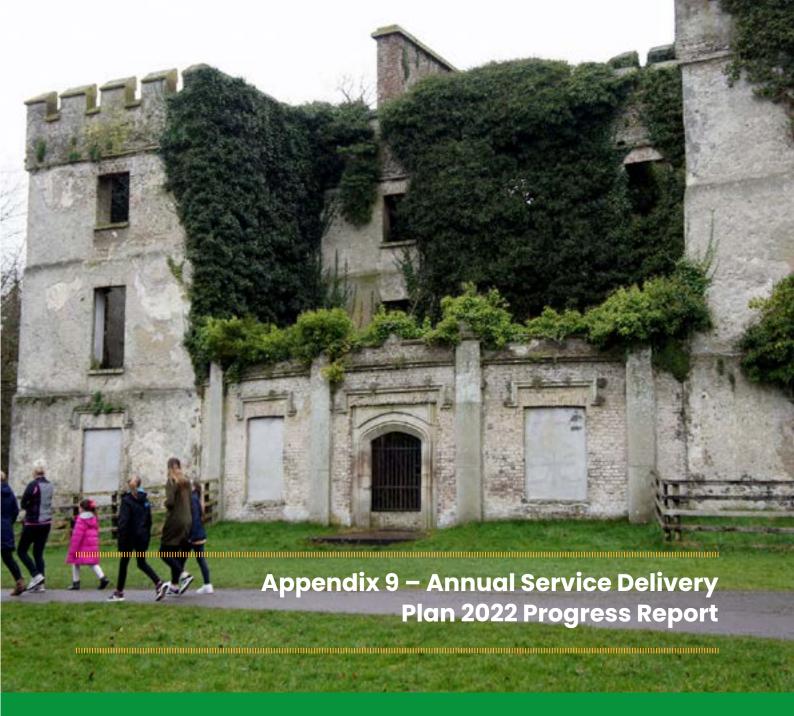
