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

Our 2024 Annual Report is a great opportunity for us to look back at the achievements and progress of Kildare County Council throughout the year. This year has been marked by significant achievements across all our directorates, reflecting our commitment to enhancing the quality of life for the citizens of Kildare.

Kildare County Council has made remarkable strides in many areas including climate action and community development.

Kildare County Council is hugely committed to climate action and is leading by example and playing our part in addressing the crises of Climate. The Community Climate Action Programme saw the approval of 24 projects by the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications, with several already completed. Our installation of high-efficiency solar PV panels at the Cotton Mills building and the piloting of a Hyundai Kona EV for staff use have contributed to substantial reductions in carbon emissions. Additionally, the HackTheClimate 2024 event showcased innovative solutions to pressing climate issues.

Our community centres have continued to serve as vital hubs for local groups. This year, we opened a new centre in Kilcock and continued to deliver community spaces by purchasing and renovating new centres in Rathangan, Carbury, Clane and Allenwood.

The Brigid 1500 festival celebrated St. Brigid's legacy, engaging communities and reaching global audiences. The festival featured a variety of events, including historical reenactments, cultural

performances, and educational workshops. Local artists and performers showcased their talents, and there were numerous opportunities for community members to participate in the celebrations.

The soft opening of Kerdiffstown Park took place in October and marked a significant milestone in our community's journey towards creating vibrant and sustainable public spaces. The transformation of Kerdiffstown Park from a former landfill site into a 30 – hectare multi use park, including 2 full-size all-weather sports pitches, a playground, several paths and walking trails, vast open green spaces, visitor car parks and age friendly seating is a testament to our commitment to environmental sustainability and community development.

In 2024, Kildare County Council also processed over 26,000 electors and managed multiple electoral events, including Local Elections with 90 candidates. Additionally, our Library Service has expanded its offerings, including the opening of Naas Library & Cultural Centre and the launch of the Kildare Seed Library. Our Arts Service has supported numerous community projects, including the Brigid Sings collaborative project and Culture Night events.

Significant progress has been made in enhancing the public realm across Kildare. Our Strategic Projects and Public Realm section has been instrumental in publishing town and village plans, completing statutory processes, and securing funding for various projects. These initiatives have focused on improving the quality of life for residents and creating vibrant, accessible, and sustainable public spaces.

Considerable progress has been made on housing delivery across the county. We successfully delivered direct build units in Ard Sceach, Coill Dubh, and Blackridge, Athgarvan, with 101 units in progress at year-end. We also delivered 422 new and second-hand homes, allocated homes to 670 housing applicants, and approved 21 home loans. Our efforts in the Traveller Accommodation Programme 2019-2024 resulted in the delivery of 95 homes, exceeding the target of 89 homes.

Finally, the Local Property Tax funding has supported hundreds of community projects, environmental initiatives, county maintenance, and cultural programmes. This funding has significantly contributed to the quality of life and infrastructure of the citizens of Kildare.

Together, we have made significant progress in enhancing the services and facilities available to the people of Kildare. We look forward to continuing our work in the coming year, building on these successes and striving for even greater achievements.



Overview of 2024:

Over €5.6m in Local Property Tax funding was allocated in 2024 to the five Municipal Districts in Kildare, contributing to the development and delivery of hundreds of community projects, environmental initiatives, county maintenance as well as creative and cultural programmes.

Local Property Tax is an annual tax on residential properties, based on their market value and the allocation of this funding on an annual basis by Kildare County Council contributes to the quality of life and infrastructure of the citizens of Kildare across the five Municipal District Areas of the county.





Climate

Climate:

In 2024, Kildare County Council's Climate Action Office continued to address climate change and worked to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, focusing on implementing the actions outlined in Kildare County Council Climate Action Plan (2024-2029). This newly adopted plan sets out a comprehensive strategy to help Kildare achieve the national target of reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 51% by 2030.

Overview of 2024:

Community Climate Action Programme

In 2024, the Community Climate Action Programme saw significant progress. Twenty-four projects were approved by the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications (DECC) for the Community Climate Action Fund grant. Grantees have 18 months to complete their projects, and since the grants were finalised in September 2024, four projects have already been completed.

The first recoupment from DECC was completed in early December 2024, covering approximately €200,000 of the total allocation of €897,000.

On June 16, 2024, Harbour Field in Maynooth hosted another successful family day out with a climate and sustainability theme to the day.



Community climate action programme

This Programme was introduced in 2024, with funding from Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications, which supports small and large, rural and urban communities in taking climate action at the local level.


PV Array Installation

In December 2024, 208 high-efficiency solar PV panels were commissioned at the Kildare County Council Cotton Mills building.



Kildare County Council Go Car

In 2024, a Hyundai Kona EV was piloted for Kildare County Council staff use. Eighty-seven staff members registered as users, and the car recorder 12,303 km travelled, with a monthly average of 1,025 km. The Kona EV's 12,303 km distance travelled resulted in 1.2 tons of carbon emissions, compared to 2.9 tons for a petrol Kona and 4.3 tons for a diesel Kona. The vehicle was funded internally, but based on the hours it was booked, it would have cost €12,900.73, including VAT for the year or €1,075.06 per month.

Community

Community:

The Community department develops and leads initiatives aimed at providing civic leadership, provides opportunities for community engagement and supports community leadership. Our community team includes support from and coordination of Kildare Local Community Development Committee (LCDC) which strives to provide strategic, joined-up systems for local and community development. The adoption of the Local Economic and Community Plan (LECP) 2024-2029 officially sets out priorities for future community and economic development, and ensures a continued focus on social inclusion, health, and wellbeing in County Kildare.

Overview of 2024:

Community Centres

Kildare County Council continued to maintain and oversee over 20 community centres in the county, ensuring their use as public spaces for community groups. We also continued the delivery of community spaces with the purchase and renovation of new community centres in Rathangan, Carbury, Clane and Allenwood.

In May 2024, we celebrated the official opening of the new Community Centre in Kilcock, marking a significant milestone in fostering a strong sense of community. The centre includes a multi-purpose recreation hall with changing facilities, two multipurpose rooms and a projector room. The vision behind the centre is to provide a central hub to serve the local area, residents, sporting organisations, clubs, schools, and community groups.

Brigid 1500

Kildare County Council successfully delivered a diverse programme of events for Brigid 1500, celebrating St. Brigid, A Woman, A Life, A Legacy.

The 10 day programme included festivals, concerts, talks, art commissions, illuminations, and workshops, engaging communities in the many facets of St. Brigid's legacy. The events showcased Kildare's historic sites, reaching global audiences through media coverage and online platforms. In addition, a schools education programme 'The Life and Times of St. Brigid' was delivered.



Community Recognition Fund

Kildare County Council was allocated funding of €830,007 under the 2024 Community Recognition Fund. This fund provided for major enhancements to communities across the county that have shared their facilities and infrastructure with those displaced from Ukraine and other countries.

Grant Schemes

Community organisations around the county have been supported through various grant schemes, which have continued to grow each year. In 2024, Kildare County Council supported 1,042 grants and provided funding of €2,412,938. Kildare County Council are committed to supporting communities to identify, develop, and implement projects to improve quality of life for the people of Kildare.


Social Inclusion and Community Activation Programme (SICAP)

The national social inclusion programme SICAP, implemented by County Kildare LEADER Partnership and overseen by Kildare LCDC, worked with 75 community groups and 913 individuals in 2024, exceeding targets. The total SICAP budget for 2024 was €1,693,183. SICAP works with the most disadvantaged communities and groups in County Kildare through a series of agreed targeted actions.

LCDC

Local Economic and Community Plan (LECP) 2024-2029

The Local Economic and Community Plan 2024-2029 was adopted by Kildare County Council in April 2024, and the accompanying Implementation Plan 2024-2026 was agreed in July. The LECP sets out priorities for community and economic development, with four high level goals and a series of objectives and priority actions.

Rural Development LEADER Programme

2024 saw the commencement of the second LEADER programme in Kildare, overseen by Kildare LCDC and implemented by County Kildare LEADER Partnership. Three projects were approved coming to a total value of €256,048. Two projects were under the economic development and job creation theme and one project was under the rural infrastructure and social inclusion theme. In 2024, the claims for LEADER 2014-2022 continued with 23 claims paid to a total value of €909,292.

LEADER Project - Graze Dairy

Sláintecare (Athy)

The Department of Health-funded Sláintecare Local Development Officer continued to progress the agreed plan in 2024, working with key stakeholders. New developments included planning for a Health and Wellbeing Kiosk in Athy and securing €75,000 for initiatives focusing on Trauma Informed Practice, Food Insecurity and Positive Placemaking. Sláintecare secured €142,000 through Dormant Accounts funding to progress traveller education and men's development. This was one of five projects funded nationally. Pilot initiatives commenced through Sláintecare also helped secure €100,000 through national Child Poverty funding to support neurodiverse children and their families. This was one of four successful projects nationally.



Healthy Ireland

Healthy Ireland Round 4 was launched in Kildare in 2023 and continued in 2024, rolling out programmes under the priority themes of physical activity and mental health.

Local Enhancement Funding 2024

In 2024, €163,842.45 was awarded to 54 community groups to support capital costs, in addition to €37,030.02 to 14 Women's Sheds through the LCDC from the Department of Rural and Community Development.

Empowering Communities Programme Athy

Athy continued as a target area for the 'Empowering Communities Programme' (ECP) with a funding allocation of €140,000, implemented by County Kildare LEADER Partnership.

Kildare Sports Partnership

Kildare Sports Partnership aims to increase participation in sport and physical activity through quality programmes, and education and training opportunities. In 2024, Kildare Sports Partnership engaged with over 27,000 people in Kildare through various programmes.

Community Development

The community development team continued to provide support with a particular emphasis on disadvantaged communities. Funding was secured from the Department of Health to reduce period poverty, allowing free period products in community centres and rest centres.

Three community groups were nominated and supported to enter the National Pride of Place Awards. We are proud to have had a winner with Straffan taking first place in the 'area with a population between 1000-2000' category and to have had Castlefen Housing Estate placed as runner up in the 'Urban Neighbourhoods and Housing Estates' category.

The Pride in your Place competition continued in 2024 and acknowledged the efforts of Local Authority Residents and residents associations to develop their communities, maintain individual gardens and public open spaces.



Kildare Age Friendly Programme

The Kildare Age Friendly Programme was a National winner at the Age Friendly Recognition and Achievement Awards with the Ballymore Eustace Age Friendly Climate Friendly Village.

Two Age Friendly Roadshows took place in 2024, one in North Kildare and one in South Kildare, with over 300 attendees.

Castlefen Housing Estate was launched as Ireland's first age friendly housing estate.

Environment

Environment and Water:

In 2024, Kildare County Council continued to make significant progress in relation to environmental management and water conservation. The Council’s efforts included the completion and opening of Kerdiffstown Park, the construction of columbarium walls at various cemeteries, and the successful piloting of a weed-cutting boat on the River Barrow. Additionally, initiatives such as the Mattress and Paint Amnesty resulted in unprecedented levels of waste collection and Naas was awarded first place out of 40 towns and cities in the IBAL Litter League.

Overview of 2024:

- Construction work completed at Kerdiffstown and the park was opened to the public in October 2024. Ongoing environmental management and monitoring on going by environmental staff, in accordance with the EPA licence.



Naas IBAL Award Winners

- Kildare County Council achieved a “Strong or Excellent” score across all 20 National Enforcement Priority categories for the second consecutive year in the EPA’s Local Performance Framework.
- Naas was top of the rankings of 40 towns and cities in the IBAL Litter League
- Construction of columbarium walls at St. Conleth’s cemetery, Newbridge, St. Michael’s cemetery, Athy and Confey cemeteries.

- A mattress amnesty held on 31st August and a paint amnesty on 28th September resulted in unprecedented levels of paint and mattresses collected. There were 37.3 tonnes of waste paint collected, and 22.92 tonnes of mattresses collected.
- Successful piloting of a weed cutting boat on the River Barrow. A sizeable section of the river was de-weeded outside of Monasterevin, despite the environmental constraints that its designation as a special area of conservation affords.



Corporate, People & Cultural Services

Corporate Services

The Corporate Services Department is responsible for several core activities, including:

- Providing first point of contact customer service management via e-mail, post, phone and in person
- Providing support services for elected members and servicing statutory meetings
- Maintaining the register of electors
- Administrative support services to the Chief Executive and Management Team
- Operating the media and communications function for the organisation
- Overseeing performance and supporting compliance regarding official languages obligations
- Managing Freedom of Information and Data Protection obligations
- Facilities Management along with the coordination of several corporate wide functions across directorates

Overview of 2024:

- Comprehensive and accessible service was provided to the 40 elected members of Kildare County Council across 5 Municipal Districts.
- 98 statutory meetings were supported throughout the year and webcast the 14 Full Council Meetings.
- All elected members statutory requirements in relation to the Public Register were administered within the necessary timeframes and published online where required.
- The procurement unit established in 2023, continues to assist staff to ensure, procurement compliance, the use of OGP Framework Agreements, staff awareness, training, standardising procurement procedures, green procurement, and promoting the goal of attaining Value for Money for public money spent.



- The Procurement Unit held a 'Meet the Supplier Event' in November 2024 in conjunction with the Kildare Local Enterprise Office to support networking with SMEs which received significant attendance and positive feedback.
- A new lighting control system was installed in Áras Chill Dara to reduce energy consumption.
- Works substantially completed on the new Document Storage Facility located adjacent to Áras Chill Dara.
- The Public Sector Duty Implementation Framework Document under Human Rights & Equality Commission Guidance, was approved in October 2024. A steering committee will set out our approach to delivering on our requirements under the framework.
- In Q4 2024, the newly elected Council adopted a new Strategic Policy Committee Scheme for 2024-2029 and Kildare County Council's Corporate Plan for the five year term of this Council.
- A dedicated communications campaign, including the production of a video and podcast, highlighted the significant strides in developing Kerdiffstown Park into a valuable local amenity from a former landfill. The video and podcast outlined the importance of public consultation and engagement throughout the project, ensuring that the park meets the needs of the community and visitors. The podcast and video was used as an information resource and was used across social media to create awareness and publicity.

Electoral events

- 2024 was a huge year for electoral events, with a Referendum in March, Local and European Elections in June and a General Election in November. Kildare County Council continued to process more than the national average of online applications on the online Check the Register system, adding over 26,000 electors to the register in the last year.
- Local Elections 2024 was a key highlight of the year, with 90 candidates running across 8 Local Electoral Areas, the Counts (and Recounts) lasting from Saturday June 7 to Wednesday June 11, culminating in the election of 40 Councillors, 10 of whom were elected for the first time.
- Kildare County Council continued to operate Casual Trading Bye Laws and address growing demand for outdoor trading, granting 28 licences in 2024, the highest number on record.
- The Customer Service performance of the Council continued positively with 88% of the almost 33,000 Customer and Elected Representative cases submitted responded to within Service Level Agreement targets.

Irish Language:

- Kildare County Council is committed to providing quality public services in all official languages of the state and respectfully recognises its statutory obligations and commitments under the Official Languages Acts (OLAs) 2003 and 2021. In this regard, our Official Languages Officer oversees performance and, as appropriate, reports to the Chief Executive in relation to the Council's obligations.
- To support the organization's compliance with said obligations, Kildare County Council appointed its first full-time Irish Language Officer in Q2 2024. Our Irish Language Officer provides legal guidance, resources and Irish language supports to all sections and departments.
- Our official languages cases tracker system has recently been evaluated and enhanced thereby ensuring An Coimisinéir Teanga cases are assigned and resolved in the most efficient manner.
- Under Section 9(2) of the OLAs 2003 and 2021, citizens have a right to receive replies to written correspondence in the same official language.

Regarding this language right, and with a view to avoiding unintended breaches in future, Corporate Services in conjunction with the IT department, have risk assessed and enhanced the Council's bilingual CRM system.

- Under Section 10A of the Official Languages (Amendment) Act 2021, the Council is obliged to place at least 20% of our advertising through the medium of the Irish Language and to spend at least 5% of the Council's advertising expenditure on Irish language adverts, placed through Irish language media. In line with said duties, in 2024, Kildare County Council placed 30% of local and national newspaper adverts, 24% of social media adverts and 16% of radio adverts through the medium of Irish. Bespoke Irish language adverts were developed for the 'Brigid – Spiorad Chill Dara 2025' advertising campaign: 84 television adverts were broadcast on TG4, 18 adverts were broadcast on Raidió na Gaeltachta and 70 adverts were broadcast on Raidió na Life.
- Kildare County Council's weekly 'Ciorcal Comhrá', Club Cúpla Focal, was established in June 2024. Through the Club Cúpla Focal initiative Kildare County Council employees and Elected Members are provided with an opportunity to learn and use Irish on a weekly basis. Through Club Cúpla Focal 360+ speaking opportunities were created in 2024. Opportunities for employees to read the Irish language were provided monthly in 'Cúinne na Gaeilge', the Irish language section of an internal staff newsletter 'The Pulse'.
- 26 staff members became members of Gréasán Gaeilge na hEarnála Poiblí, the government's newly-established network which aims to bring together people who work in the public sector and are interested in using, practicing or developing their Irish.
- Customer Service team members attended Gaelchultúr's 'Telephone and Customer Service Training Course', and Elected members attended Gaelchultúr's 'Irish Language Course for Elected Councillors'.
- Coiste Gaeilge na Comhairle administered Scéim na Scoláireachtaí Gaeltachta, awarding Gaeltacht Scholarships to five pupils from various municipal districts.

- Kildare Library Service and Creative Ireland, in partnership with Maynooth University, appointed their first joint Irish Language Writer-in-Residence, Ré Ó Laighléis.
- Kildare Library Service's Coiste Gaeilge, in partnership with Maynooth University, hosted 'An Tolg Liteartha' in the Riverbank Arts Centre. 'An Tolg Liteartha' was recorded and broadcast by Raidió na Gaeltachta.
- Kildare Arts and Library Service hosted many Irish language events, including a Christmas drama 'An Nollaig sa Naigin' and 'Óiche Airneáil sa Leabharlann', which can still be enjoyed on the Kildare Reads podcast: Kildare Reads | Podcast
- Kildare County Council continued to support 'Scéim Forbartha Líonraí Gaeilge - Irish Language Network Development Scheme'.





Human Resources

Human Resources:

The Human Resources Department's core activities include recruitment, staff training and development, staff welfare, industrial relations and superannuation. Kildare County Council is dedicated to fostering a supportive and productive work environment, ensuring that all employees have access to necessary and desirable resources and opportunities. Additionally, the Human Resources Department led the preparation of a Workforce Plan for the organisation, to assist with future planning and ensure adequate staffing resources for the delivery of high-quality services.

Overview of 2024:

- Continued positive engagement with local union Fórsa and in 2024 and arising from the transfer of Water Services to Uisce Éireann, a Joint Forum was established in July 2023 to collaborate on the various issues in relation to the transition, in particular, the staff reassignment processes.
- In line with our Wellbeing Strategy 2023-2025, terms of reference for our first Wellbeing Working Group were formulated in 2024 for Senior Management approval. This group will assist and advise in developing a long-term action plan, identifying priority areas and an appropriate implementation plan that supports the health and wellbeing of our staff.
- The Employee Assistance Program and Wellbeing Portal continues to provide 'on the spot' counselling services, for personal and work-related issues, including access to hours of wellbeing content that support the four pillars of wellbeing set out in our Wellbeing Strategy – Social, Physical, Mental and Financial wellbeing.
- Commenced work on a strategic workforce plan for 2025 – 2029. This iterative process aims to develop insights, to baseline, forecast and plan in a strategic and informed way so that we are poised to deliver our services and Corporate Plan objectives.
- Designed a new online performance management development system, e-PMDS, to replace traditional paper-based performance tracking. This system will provide real-time

access to performance metrics, development plans and feedback for employees and line managers, ensuring a more engaging and effective performance management process.

- Commenced the development of a Mobility Policy, which serves as a guiding framework to manage workforce movements across the organisation. The policy, set to launch in 2025, will provide a structured approach to transfers, assess operational efficiencies, support talent retention and career growth, and align with organisational goals & objectives.





Kildare Library and Arts Service:

The Library and Arts Service is dedicated to providing a wide range of cultural, educational, and recreational services to the community. The service aims to foster a love for reading, creativity, and continued learning across all age cohorts.

In 2024, the Kildare Library Service achieved several milestones, including the opening of the Naas Library & Cultural Centre and the refurbishment of the Kildare Town library. The service also celebrated the 15th Anniversary of the Kildare Readers Festival and expanded the Kildare Seed Library. Additionally, public access laptops were upgraded and are now more user friendly.

The Kildare Arts Service led various community dance projects and collaborative music projects, supported public engagement through the Arts, Health and Wellbeing Programme, and hosted 67 free events for Culture Night. The service also launched the 'Art House' gallery and workshop space, providing a dedicated venue for artistic expression and community engagement.

Overview of 2024:

- On Friday January 19th Naas Library & Cultural Centre opened its doors for the first time after a 3-year restoration and adjoining new build project. It was officially launched on April 15th. During 2024, 136,088 people visited the new library, 135,591 items were issued and 11,978 registered as members.
- Kildare Library Service applied for and successfully received a total capital grant of €5.1 million from Department of Rural & Community Development towards construction of a new Newbridge Library, County Archives & Cultural Centre, a new Clane Library and a new Mobile Library.
- Kildare Town library reopened June 6th after a major refurbishment of the windows, staff facilities, and new flooring.
- The 15th Anniversary of Kildare Readers Festival took place from 9th October to 13th October 2024. We held 13 events with over 700 audience attendees. All English language events included ISL interpretation. We had fantastic events including modern Irish history events with Catherine Corless, Diarmuid Ferriter and Irish LGBTQ+ history with Páraic Kerrigan and Anna Nolan.
- Kildare Seed Library expanded to 7 libraries. Each library has a collection of open pollinated seeds to grow your own vegetables and edible flowers.

Each library hosted a talk on seed saving and will host seasonal educational workshops on growing and seed saving.

- With a grant from the Department of Rural & Community Development of €98k, Kildare Libraries upgraded and expanded its fleet of public access laptops. 52 modern, 2-in-1 convertible touchscreen laptops are now available to borrow across 10 library branches for use in the library.





Kildare County Council's Housing & Regeneration Department aims to provide social and affordable housing for the people of Kildare. Significant progress was made in 2024 with the delivery of direct build units in various locations and the adoption of key policies and strategies.

Efforts to address vacancy included the Compulsory Purchase programme and the Vacant Homes Grant. The launch of the 'Do I Qualify for Social Housing' website improved information for housing applicants. The Housing Adaptation and Disabled Person Grants Scheme supported households so that a person with a disability could remain in their home. Maintenance efforts included completing response maintenance jobs and upgrading council-owned properties under the Energy Retrofit Programme. The council also approved home loans and units for the Affordable Purchase Scheme. In addition, the council serviced sites for sale. The Traveller Accommodation Programme exceeded its target in delivering homes.







Strategic Projects and Public Realm

The Public Realm and Strategic Projects team continued work on enhancing the quality and functionality of public spaces within the community. In 2024, significant progress was made with the publication of 13 Town & Village Plans and the commencement of two new plans. The council completed three Part 8 statutory processes and saw the completion of one capital project. Additionally, three more Part 8 statutory processes were commenced. Introduction

The Local Authority Integration Team, a dedicated resource within Kildare County Council, was established in January 2024. The team's primary goal is to support the integration, self-reliance, independence and participation in Irish life of people who are seeking international protection and living in Kildare. The team provides various supports, including organising information clinics, solving access issues to services, and guiding individuals through processes such as applying for medical assistance or job training. The team collaborates closely with departments across the council, with agencies and with community groups to address specific needs and support the integration process.

Overview of 2024:

From March–December 2024, Kildare LAIT conducted 41 outreach visits and arranged 175 information clinics, supporting 1,035 people and solving 1,617 queries.

Furthermore, Kildare LAIT supported 137 people through four activities including an anti-racism training, two workshop on understanding how the far right operates and how to counteract disruption within our communities (November & December 2024); 6 week psychosocial programme with body-based trauma informed activities targeted at GBV survivors accommodated by IPAS (November); and an information session on the international protection system in Ireland (September).

From September 2024 the Accommodation Team held Day-75 Clinics at the Newhall and Punchestown Designated Accommodation Centres at approximately 2 to 3 week intervals to assist residents in sourcing accommodation prior to the end of their 90 day state provided accommodation period. The Offer a Home and Pledged Accommodation schemes operated by the Accommodation Team was the main source of accommodation.

The Accommodation team assessed accommodation proposals for both International Protection Applicants and Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection including the establishment of the Newhall Designated Accommodation Centre with a capacity for 985 people.

Through the Irish Refugee Protection Programme (IRPP), the Integration Team resettled and provided integration supports to 14 programme refugees.



Kildare County Council's Planning Department continue to plan for sustainable communities through ensuring that the right development takes place in the right locations and at the right time and provide for social, economic and physical infrastructure necessary to meet the needs of our people in a way that protects the qualities of our natural and built environment.

In 2024, the council focused on climate action by publishing guidelines on Permeability, Sustainable Urban Drainage Systems, and Allotment & Community Gardens. The Draft Maynooth and Environs Local Area Plan 2025-2031 was published, marking Kildare County Council's first Low Carbon Local Area Plan. Additionally, the Conservation Management Plan for the Cassidy Distillery Building was published.

Overview of 2024:

- In 2024, we focused on streamlining climate action throughout the planning process by preparing and publishing guidelines and strategies related to Permeability, Sustainable Urban Drainage Systems, and Allotment & Community Gardens.
- In 2024, we published the Draft Maynooth and Environs Local Area Plan 2025-2031 in collaboration with Meath County Council, marking Kildare County Council's first Low

Carbon Local Area Plan with a series of associated consultation events.

- Additionally, Kildare County Council published a Conservation Management Plan for the Cassidy Distillery Building, Monasterevin.
- Administered funding from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage via the Historic Structures Fund (HSF) and the Built Heritage Investment Scheme (BHIS). During 2024, the total amount administered by Kildare County Council under these funds was €282,500.





Building Control

Overview of 2024:

- A publicly accessible map interface has been substantially developed to view the taking in charge status of housing estates, expected to go live in 2025.
- The Consultation Portal was utilised to streamline two processes: online receipt of Taking in Charge requests and applications to view Building Control records.
- Continued success of the Legacy Estate Remediation Project, with 11 out of the 19 estates taken in charge in 2024, being part of the Legacy Project. This project sees older estates which are unfinished or where the developer is no longer active and there are outstanding defects, brought to a taking in charge standard.
- Dealt with a 40% increase in Commencement Notices, attributable to the Uisce Eireann and Development Contribution Waivers schemes, which ran to the end of 2024.




Emergency Services

Fire Services are provided from six strategically located retained Fire Stations across the county. The Engineer, Educate, Enforce paradigm is used in the Fire Safety section to enhance the fire safety in the built environment including the Emergency Management and Special Projects section which co-ordinates emergency management preparation across the council.

Overview of 2024:

- Maynooth Fire Station: Construction of the new fire station at Maynooth commenced in June 2024. The expected completion date is June 2025.

- Apartments Defects Remediation Scheme: Kildare Fire Service participated in the "Pathfinder" project to establish working procedures and protocols for dealing with applications accepted onto the scheme. A new staffing allocation for this scheme has been sanctioned.
- Firefighters Workplace Relations Commission (WRC) Agreement: Kildare Fire Service worked throughout 2024 to achieve compliance with the terms of the 2023 Firefighters WRC Agreement. At time of writing, there are 2 vacancies across the service, with 70 of 72 retained fire service positions filled. New crew structures are in place and all promotional positions have been filled.





Transportation & Mobility

With responsibility for over 2,500 kilometres of roadway in County Kildare, the directorate develops, maintains, and manages the county's road network for the benefit of pedestrians, cyclists and motorists, as well as for public service and commercial vehicles. Major capital infrastructure projects are managed and delivered with annual funding provided by Government Departments and related agencies, and direct funding from Kildare County Council.

The combined technical and administrative workforce ensures the safety of vehicles and vulnerable road users through the provision of an extensive traffic management system and a network of pedestrian crossings.

The Sustainable Transport Section continued to deliver active travel and road safety measures and activities in 2024, and to support initiatives which promote walking, cycling and public transport usage.

Overview of 2024:

Machinery Yard and Regional Salt Barn

The new Machinery Yard and Regional Salt Barn, Newhall, Naas, became operational in 2024, with operations transferred from Newbridge in May. Winter salting commenced from the new salt barn in late 2024.

The Municipal District Offices completed surface dressing and road restoration on 158 kilometres of local and regional road in 2024. Safety improvement works were carried out at 12 locations on regional and local roads and climate resilience measures were implemented at three locations.

Eight bridges were identified as requiring priority works for renewal and maintenance. These were completed during the year, in addition to emergency works carried out in a number of locations.

Sustainable Transport Section

2024 saw the highest drawdown of National Transport Authority (NTA) Active Travel funding to date at €10.5M. Over 35 schemes were progressed with the continued design and delivery of cycle routes and greenway active travel projects throughout the county. Kildare County Council facilitated the installation of new bus stop infrastructure, including shelters, across the county to support the expanded Local Link services and other Public Service Operated routes.

Construction of Active Travel Schemes

Section 1 of the Royal Canal Greenway between Maynooth and Leixlip was completed in 2023 and work continued throughout 2024 with the project scheduled for completion in mid 2025. The Kilcullen Road Active Travel Scheme in Naas opened during the year.

I, Sonya Kavanagh, Chief Executive (CE) of Kildare County Council am responsible for the annual financial statement (AFS), prepared by the Head of Finance, in accordance with the accounting code of practice issued by the Minister under section 107 of the Local Government Act, 2001.

I certify that the unaudited financial statements of Kildare County Council for the year ended 31 December 2024, are in agreement with the books of account and have been prepared in accordance with the accounting requirements of the Minister of Housing, Local Government and Heritage.

The AFS is subject to external audit, by an auditor of the Local Government Audit Service, whose purpose is to form an independent opinion of the accounts and state whether the annual financial statement presents fairly the financial position of the local authority and of its income and expenditure for the period in question, and whether the transactions of the audited body conform with the statutory or other authorisation under which they purport to have been carried out.

The Annual Financial Statement for 2023 has been audited. The figures reported herein for 2024 form part of the unaudited Annual Financial Statement for 2024. The Local Government Auditor will commence the audit of Kildare County Council's Annual Financial Statement in July 2025. When the audit is concluded, the audit report will be presented to Kildare County Council's Audit Committee and the Elected Members of Kildare County Council. The audit is expected to conclude by October 2025.

The AFS reports on the day-to-day activity of Kildare County Council in the form of the Statement of Comprehensive Income & Expenditure, summarised by Division. The Statement of Financial Position outlines the Kildare County Council overall financial position as of the 31st of December 2024.

The Statement of Comprehensive Income represents expenditure and income on the day-to-day running of the Kildare County Council.

A Statement of Funds Flow was introduced as part of AFS 2011. While the guidance of International Accounting Standard 7 Statement of Cash Flows has been followed, the business of local authorities is substantially different to most private sector organisations and therefore some minor changes to the format have been agreed to ensure the data displayed is meaningful and useful within the local government sector.

System of Internal Financial Controls

As Chief Executive of Kildare County Council, I acknowledge my responsibility for ensuring that an effective system of internal financial control is maintained and operated by Kildare County Council.

This responsibility is exercised in the context of the resources available to Kildare County Council.

Also, any system of internal financial control can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance that assets are safeguarded, transactions authorised and properly recorded, and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or would be detected in a timely manner.

Maintaining the system of internal financial controls is a continuous process and the system and its effectiveness are kept under ongoing review.

Financial control environment

As Chief Executive of Kildare County Council, I confirm that a financial control environment containing the following elements is in place:

- Financial responsibilities have been assigned at management level with corresponding accountability.
- Reporting arrangements have been established at all levels where responsibility for financial management has been assigned.
- Formal procedures have been established for reporting significant control failures and ensuring appropriate corrective action.
- There is an Audit Committee which as part of its work programme regularly review the internal financial control system.
- Procedures for all key business processes have been documented.
- There are systems in place to safeguard the assets.

Administrative Controls and Management Reporting

As Chief Executive of Kildare County Council, I confirm that a framework of administrative procedures and regular management reporting is in place including segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability and, in particular, that:

- procedures for key business processes have been documented
- there are systems aimed at ensuring the security of the ICT systems
- there are systems in place to safeguard the assets of the local authority and
- there are appropriate capital investment control guidelines and formal project management disciplines in operation.

Procurement compliance

Kildare County Council ensures that there is an appropriate and ongoing focus on good practice in tendering and purchasing and that procedures are in place to ensure compliance with all relevant procurement guidelines.

Internal audit and Audit Committee

As Chief Executive, I can confirm that Kildare County Council has an internal audit function with appropriately trained personnel, which operates in accordance with a written charter. Its work is informed by analysis of the financial risks to which Kildare County Council is exposed, and its annual internal audit plans are based on this analysis. I am satisfied that there are procedures in place to ensure that the reports of the internal audit function are followed up.

I can confirm that Kildare County Council has an effective audit committee which carries out an annual effectiveness review of their activities. I can also confirm that an Audit Committee is in place in accordance with the requirements of Section 122 of the Local Government Act 2001 (as amended).

The statutory functions of audit committees as set out in section 59 and 60 of the Local Government Reform Act 2014 are as follows:

- i. to review financial and budgetary reporting practices and procedures within the local authority that has established it;
- ii. to foster the development of best practice in the performance by the local authority of its internal audit function;
- iii. to review any audited financial statement, auditor's report or auditor's special report in relation to the local authority and assess any actions taken within that authority by its chief executive in response to such a statement or report and to report to that authority on its findings;
- iv. to assess and promote efficiency and value for money with respect to the local authority's performance of its functions; and
- v. to review systems that are operated by the local authority for the management of risks.

I recognise that the audit committee plays a crucial role in the governance framework of local authorities, particularly in the context of increased public sector accountability. They have an independent role in advising the Council on financial reporting processes, internal control, risk management and audit matters as part of the systematic review of the control environment and governance procedures of the local authority.

I acknowledge the Audit Committee's role in the risk management process and in the continuing review of the control environment and governance procedures in Kildare County Council.

Risk and control framework

Kildare County Council has implemented a risk management system which identifies and reports key risks and the management actions being taken to address and, to the extent possible, mitigate those risks.

A corporate risk register is in place which identifies the key risks and evaluates and grades them according to their significance. The register is reviewed and updated by the Management Team on a regular basis. There is also a risk register in place for each service division and these are also reviewed and updated on a regular basis.

The outcome of these assessments is used to plan and allocate resources to ensure risks are managed to an acceptable level. The risk registers which detail the controls and actions needed to mitigate risks and responsibilities for the operation of controls are assigned to specific staff.

As Chief Executive, I confirm that key risks and related controls have been identified, and processes have been put in place to monitor the operation of those key controls and report any identified deficiencies.

The Statement of Internal Financial Control will be included in the draft Annual Report submitted to Council members and thereafter included in the published Annual Report prepared and adopted by the Council by 30 June.

CORE PRINCIPLE 7 – Good governance means actively contributing to the furtherance and achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals by delivering on the priorities and actions within the Climate Action Plan and the provisions of the Climate Act.

Our Commitment to Good Governance

As the Cathaoirleach/Mayor and Chief Executive of the council, and on behalf of the elected members, management and staff we confirm that;
