Cllr. Brett (Cathaoirleach) welcomed the Members and Officials to the Special Planning Meeting to consider the Chief Executive's Report on Member's Motions and Chief Executive's Material Alterations to the Kildare County Development Plan 2023 – 2029

Mr. Conlon advised the Members of their obligations for the meeting as follows;

Section 20(3) of the Planning and Development Acts 2000 to 2014 (as amended) states that the Members of the Council are restricted to:



- Considering the proper planning and sustainable development of the area to which the development plan/local area plan relates;
- The statutory obligations of the local authority; and
- Any relevant policies or objectives for the time being of the Government or any Minister of the Government.

In addition, the Elected Members, acting in the interests of the common good and the proper planning and sustainable development of the area, must, in accordance with the 'Code of Conduct for Councillors' (July 2019) prepared under the Local Government Act 2001 (as amended), carry out their duties in a transparent manner, must follow due process and must make their decisions based on relevant considerations.

The Section 28 Ministerial Draft Development Plan Guidelines (2021) issued by the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government state that the statutory elements and remit of the County Development Plan are set out clearly in the Planning and Development Act. In preparing the County Development Plan, Planning Authorities must exercise caution not to inappropriately stray into the operation of other statutory codes and regulatory regimes that relate to the development sector but are outside the remit of a development plan. This is applicable to policy or objectives for non-planning functions governed by other legislation and regulations.

Cllr. Breslin advised that meeting that the motions submitted in her name on the report should all listed in the Labour Party name.

The Cathaoirleach proposed to the Members that the Senior Executive Officer would go through all the Green items first and where members wanted to speak to the items that they advise the meeting at the end of each chapter.

Cllr. Weld considered that land zoned could not be de-zoned where sites were serviced. Cllr. Weld advised that Minister had given direction on this matter. Cllr. 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

As solar energy technologies have become more effective, areas in
Northern Europe like Ireland have become viable for technologies
including solar panels/ tubes on roof spaces and the commercial
development of solar farms together with storage facilities. As a
result, solar generated energy is increasingly contributing to a
reduction in energy demand and energy costs for a range of
commercial, industrial and residential properties. The Climate Action
Plan 2021 targets a delivery of between 1.5 and 2.5 GW of Solar PV
Capacity by 2030 as part of its effort to produce 80% of Irelands
electricity from renewable sources by 2030.
On-site auto consumption microgeneration technologies can make a
significant contribution towards a reduction in energy costs, and this
will continue as technologies develop further. This type of generation
is supported in the Climate Action Plan 2021, by Actions 105,107,108 and 138.
105,107,106 and 156.
Solar farms have the potential to affect the landscape and natural
and built heritage. Cumulative impacts may also arise with farms
located close to each other. Site selection is vital for potential solar
farms as solar resource, topography and proximity to the grid must
be considered.
Solar Energy Developments
All applications should indicate the estimated megawatt output of
the proposed solar farm.
 An assessment of the impact of the development on the
receiving landscape should be undertaken, having particular



regard to the landscape sensitivity classification, scenic routes and protected views.

- Details of the connection to the grid shall be provided with all planning applications.
- Glint and glare assessment must be undertaken and submitted with each application.
- An assessment of stormwater run-off rates must be completed for each development, and attenuation measures proposed as appropriate.
- The removal of extensive stretches of hedgerow (including within the development site) will be strongly discouraged. Where the removal of minor sections of hedgerows is proposed, the applicant shall demonstrate, to the satisfaction of the
- Planning Authority, that such removal is necessary for the development of the particular solar farm(s).
- In addition to the retention of hedgerows and other existing areas of biodiversity value, a minimum of 10% of each overall solar farm site shall be reserved for
- biodiversity purposes, including planting of native and pollinatorfriendly species or the construction of new wetland habitat.
 Larger commercial solar farms have scope for harnessing a sizable amount of solar energy while also having the greater potential for energy storage and this type of generation is supported in the Climate Action Plan 2021, Actions 102 and 104. However, the scale of these farms has the potential to affect surrounding landscapes. Cumulative impacts may also arise with farms located close to each

other. Site selection is vital for potential solar farms as solar resource, topography and proximity to the grid must be considered.



The Council is required to achieve a reasonable balance between responding to the Climate Emergency and adhering to overall positive Government policy on renewable energy, while also enabling the solar energy resources of the Planning Authority's area to be harnessed in a manner that is consistent with proper planning and sustainable development. At present, there are no national planning guidelines to guide the future development of solar farm proposals. In their absence, the Council will assess the appropriateness of individual applications received considering the following: Site aspect, suitability, and topography The Council will favour the reuse of previously developed land such as brownfield land, contaminated land or industrial land and nonproductive agricultural land in preference to productive land. **Biodiversity** While it is not compulsory for solar farms to require an Environmental Impact Assessment Report (EIAR), an EIAR may be required for projects where the proposed development would be likely to have significant effects on the environment. Schedule 7 of the Planning and Development Regulations 2001 (as amended) sets out the criteria for determining whether a development would or would not be likely to have significant effects on the environment. Furthermore, all development proposals must be screened for Appropriate Assessment and shall be subject to full Appropriate Assessment where they have the potential to have significant adverse impacts on the integrity of a Natura 2000 site, either individually or in combination with other plans or projects, in



accordance with Article 6 of the Habitats Directive 92/42/EEC. In any event, impacts to flora and fauna will be a consideration of any application.

The removal of extensive stretches of hedgerow and mature trees, wetland areas and areas of biodiversity interest (including within the development site) will not be permitted. Retention and appropriate management of existing habitats will be favoured over the planting of introduced pollinator friendly species in order to maintain and restore the existing seedbank and local biodiversity. Where the removal of minor sections of hedgerows or tree are proposed, the applicant shall demonstrate, to the satisfaction of the Planning Authority, that such removal is necessary for the development of the particular solar farm(s). Where the removal of minor sections of hedgerow is proposed, compensatory planting will be required elsewhere within the development.

Measures to treat invasive species and/or avoid their translocation must also be provided. Where it is not possible to retain the area beneath the solar panels for biodiversity purposes, a minimum of 10% of each overall solar farm site shall be reserved for biodiversity purposes, including planting of native and pollinator-friendly species or the construction of new wetland habitat.

All existing habitats on solar farm sites should be retained and appropriately managed. The planting of 'pollinator friendly' seed mixes should be avoided.



Appropriately detailed habitat management and restoration plans (including cutover bog restoration, where appropriate) for all solar farm applications must be submitted.	
Landscape character Where appropriate all applications should be accompanied by a Landscape Impact Assessment (LIA) that considers the subject site in its wider context, to include the subject site, other permitted/in the pipeline renewable energy proposals, and the impact of same on the landscape sensitivity classification, scenic routes and protected views.	
Residential amenity Noise and traffic impacts during the construction, operational and decommissioning phases will be examined to determine whether residential amenity of adjoining/nearby properties would be adversely impacted.	
Flooding Solar farms located within areas identified as being within Flood zones A or B will be subject to a Site-Specific Flood Risk Assessment, as per the Planning System and Flood Risk Management Guidelines 2009 for Planning Authorities (or any updated guidelines). 



Cllr. Farrelly further advised that existing permissions for new homes already establish a 50% growth of the 2016 population, a breach of the National Planning Framework's Planning Objective 9.
Cllr. Farrelly noted that Clane's education, medical, employment and recreation services are at capacity and many have no choice but to attend post-primary school in Celbridge, Maynooth, Naas, Prosperous and further afield. Nationally, there are 6.4 GP doctors per 10,000 population. Clane has 4 - while serving a wider hinterland. Self-sustaining towns have a solid local employment base while in Clane 1,000s have to travel elsewhere for employment.
Cllr. Farrelly also considered other self-sustaining towns have direct access to train services, Clane is at least a 20-minute car-dependent drive to stations at Sallins, Kilcock, and Maynooth.
Cllr. Farrelly cautioned that Members opposing the Planner's advice were aware of the problems in Clane and North Kildare and that where the Council overruled the planning advice then the Office of the Planning Regulator would have a basis for intervening.



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	Cllr. Hamilton queried whether the Chief's planning advice to designate Clane as a Tier 4 town in the settlement hierarchy was consistent with the Chief's advice for members in February 2022 and previously on variation 1, in June 2021.
	Cllr. Hamilton further noted the deficits in Clane and considered it faces considerable challenges and sought support for his motion that Clane is redesignated to a Town.
	Cllr. Feeney observed that the Office of the Planning Regulator's submissions on Clane set out requirements to materially alter Clane to a Tier 4 town in the Settlement Hierarchy.
	Cllr. Feeney enquired whether the legislation provided discretion for accepting the OPR's submissions on Clane, given the issues of conflict with the National Planning Framework? and if Members did not accept the Chief's Advice, do the OPR have the discretion to avoid initiating a direction to designate Clane as a Tier 4 town in the settlement hierarchy?
	Cllr. McEvoy advised that the Office of the Planning Regulator requires the Planning Authority to set Clane at the appropriate Tier 4 level.
	Cllr. McEvoy expressed concern that where the counter motions carried it would lead to additional
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pressure on roads, schools, and, local services will significantly worsen and gave an example of the re construction of the boys school that did not provide any additional capacity.
Cllr. Mc Evoy considered that the common good is expressed by making proper evidence plans for sustainable development as opposed to serving the vested interests of one development company.
Cllr. Mc Evoy specifically referred to the counter motions of Cllr. Weld and the Fianna Fail group and noted that many of the multi-unit planning permissions granted for Clane had yet to be completed. There are over 300 units built and recently occupied but a further 450 were currently under construction with more recently approved.
Cllr. Mc Evoy also advised that the matters before the courts are how An Bord Pleanála granted an additional 525 units when the CDP/LAP provides for 145 units and that the substantial increase in population in Clane and the cause of great concern in the OPR submission had yet to manifest itself.
Cllr. Wyse supported Cllr. Weld's motion and considered that Clane met the criteria for a self-sustaining town.



Cllr. Weld gave the meeting other examples of similar sized towns such Rathoath, Edenderry and Stamullen
that were all designated Self Sustaining Towns. Cllr. Wyse considered that Clane must be allowed to grow to meet the needs of young people.
Cllr. Duffy enquired whether the Core Strategy table was impacted?
Cllr. Weld considered that Clane did have up to date services and noted the designation was not about development.
Cllr. Weld noted the need for proper national funding and noted the need for a new bridge.
Cllr. Doyle supported Cllr. Wyse's comments and noted every settlement in Kildare had deficits and noted that lots of children bus it to Clane.
Cllr. Doyle considered there was a need to have great robust towns and didn't understand why Clane was not a self-sustaining town.
Cllr. Power observed that EMRA does not identify self-sustaining towns and enquired whether Clane was better serviced in one category or the other.
Cllr. Moore considered that Clane was being sacrificed by the Planning Regulator telling the



Members what to do and was effectively looking for Clane to be downsized.
Cllr. Moore considered that An Bord Pleanála gave recognition to Clane as a growth town. Cllr. Moore considered the AIRO report to be out of date and noted that 98% of Clane was serviced for water and waste water.
Cllr. Cussan noted that the Regulator was concerned for Clane and that the public would want to know why. Cllr Cussan further advised the members that the OPR ran information training for councillors in June where they had singled out Clane as a bad example of developer-led planning policies that have locked in challenging long-term and damaging pressures on the community and the surrounding area and questioned whether the Members wanted to be in this place.
Cllr. Cussan observed that the Members were required to serve the common good by adherence to statutory requirements and they were reminded of this at the start of the meeting.
Cllr Cussan queried the implication for the change of designation.
Cllr. Coleman noted that Clane didn't have a train station but neither did Naas.



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Cllr. Coleman advised that he had contacted the NTA with regard to capacity for Clane and was advised that it was possible to have high capacity and that bus capacity can be addressed easily.
Ms. Granville advised the Members that the Planning Department were not opposed to growth in Clane but noted that it must be sustainable.
Ms. Granville agreed that Clane had deficits and acknowledged that SHDs granted have to be accounted for.
Ms. Granville advised the Members that the Chief Executive designated Clane as a town in the previous plan and that the Chief Executive didn't agree to designate Clane as a self-sustaining town.
Ms. Granville advised that the Regulator has asked the question why Clane was upgraded to a self- sustaining town and noted that no evidence had been provided with the motions.
Ms. Granville advised that the Members were statutorily required to provide planning reasons that were evidenced based.
Ms. Granville observed that there was discussions among the Members that the Minister would not issue any further Ministerial Directions but cautioned



Members that of 14 development plans made, 10 had received Ministerial Direction.
Ms. Granville advised the Members that the Planning Authority did have discretion where the Planning Authority were not in agreement with the OPR's recommendations but advised that vigorous sustainable planning reasons were required and gave the Members the example of the Athy LAP where the Members had valid reasons to change a zoning and that the OPR did not issue a directive in that instance.
Ms. Granville expressed concern that in the event that the OPR issued a Direction to review the Clane LAP immediately, it would have knock on effects for the other LAPs as staff resources would have to be reallocated and the Newbridge LAP could have to be delayed.
Cllr. Heavey expressed concern that the Newbridge LAP would be delayed and considered that Newbridge needed the LAP to be reviewed.
Cllr. Stafford considered that the resources of the Council was not a planning reason not to keep Clane as a self-sustaining town.



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Cllr Cussan observed that she had the experience in Leixlip of what can happen when a Ministerial Direction is issued
Cllr. Doyle considered that the Members could put forward their planning reasons and noted their discretion has been eroded but it was the Member's decision ultimately up to Councillors.
Cllr. Farrelly noted that there were no planning reasons provided.
