TO THE KILDARE DRAINAGE COMMITTEE.
Gentlemen,
So far as I ami aware the Kildare Drainage was completed in April, 1877 . The cost was $£ 8,6574 \mathrm{~s} 6 \mathrm{~d}$. The term for repayment was
22 years so that it should appear all indebtedness was paid off in April, 1899.
In the District there are in round numbers 9 miles of main and 4 miles of tributary streams. I have travelled and seen most of the streams. Great lengths of the banks are undermined and in many places have slipped in extensively. Indeed it is not easy to except here and there. I saw many Sharps at which there was only a couple of inches of water while Pools up to 5 feet deep are frequent. There are various obstructions from growing tress and shrubs. Aquatic vegetion thick and matted roots extending into and under tine water including of course the soil in which they grow.

The cost of repairs will depend upon what we propose to do. If we contemplate restoring the water courses to what they were on completion in 1877 , it would mean drying the rivers and then remaking and reforming cver-it, would also mean bringing back the bottoms to original widths, inclinations and levels, as shown upon Drawings according to which, no doubt, the works were originally executed. The cost of this kind of work might run up to 50 per cent of the original
cost. We are forced therefore to say that the repairs possible to be done cannot restore the water courses to the cross i section and bottom inclinations as completed in 1877. The work to be done, however, must be such as will remove obstructions throughout to che free run of the water at the least expense. This work will consist in straightening up projecting portions of banks along water line, cutting and rooting out all weeds and removing interfering trees and shrubs; taking out all had shallows and all sharps ; also reshaping and repairing bonks where in danger of slips or as otherwise necessary, and in general the removal of all prominent obstructions possible without diverting the water.

An expenditure of probably $£ 400$ should do this work but it might be better to name an additional $£ 100$ as a reserve and for contangencies.
The work should be done by direct labour under Gangers but the subsequent maintenance could be by contract.
It may be useful to say that there are 14 Drainage Districts affecting County Kildare and the total cost for their construction was $£ 221,1176 \mathrm{~s} 4 \mathrm{~d}$. Of this 14 there are 10
wholly inside the County the cost of which wholly inside the County the cost of which
was $£ 106,8760$ s Sd, and 4 partly in this County and partly in adjoining Counties costing $£ 114,2416$ s 1 d .
The question therefore of eventually taking over all Drainage Districts by the County Councils is a big one.

Speaking for myself as County Surveyor I am certain that with the Assistants I have and with Quarterly payments it would be empossible for me to undertake Drainage Works on any large scale. At present every reasonable hour of my time is taken up by road work and things belonging thereto. But as regards the Kildare Drainage I will do my very best so as to have a commencement made and I will be able to say what amount of time a District like it would take including the first year of maintenance. It is the time consumed in maintenance supervision and attending to complaints, setting contracts, etc., that is the chief thing to know.

I wish to faciliate work at Kildare Drainage every way and therefore do not want cost of supervision and checking pay sheets to be
a. matter of any difficulty. I propose that 1 a. matter of any difficulty. I propose that I
he paid $£ 10$ and travelling expenses and that Mr Bergin, the Assistant Surveyor, get £10 for our part in putting the works connected with Kildare District into working order.

As regards the charge per annum on foot of supervision for after maintenance I do not know what charge would be fair so I reconmend that this part of the question be allow
ed to stand. The Kildare District will be a good test of future possibilities.

Arrangements will now have to be considered for paying men, and if possible it would be well if the County Council could advance the money for the work and then assess the lands liable in the legal proportion of the actual expenditure. This would expedite the work and prevent assessment founded on an estimate merely.

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## COUNTY COUNCIL OF KILDARE.

## STANDING ORDERS

FOR THE
REGULATION OF PROCEEDINGS AND bUsIness 0f the county council.

Order of Business.

1. 'The order of business at every meeting of the Council shall be as follows:-
[1.] The minutes of the last meeting of the Cuuncil shall be read with a view to confirmation provided that, if a copy of the minutes has been sent three clear days previously to each member of the Council, they shall be taken as read.
[2] Business expressly required by statute to be done at the meeting.
[3.] Any correspondence, comrnunications, or other business specially brought forward by direction of the Chairman.
[4.] Business remaining from the last meeting (if any).
[5.] Reports of Committees.
[6]. Notices of motion in the order in which they have been received.
17.] Any other currespondence.
[8.] Any other business.
The Cuuncil may at any meeting vary the onder of business so as to give precedence to any business of special urgency.

## Notices of Motion.

2. Every notice of motion shill be in writing signed by the member of the Council giving the notice. It shall be given to the Secretary to the Council, and shall be entered in a book to be kept in his office, which book shall be open to the inspection of every member of the Council. A notice of motion which shall not have been received prior to one o'clock in the afternoon preceding the usual day for issuing the summons for any meeting of the Council shall not be specified in the summuns for such meeting.
3. If a motion, notice of which is specified in the summons, be not moved, either by the member who has given the notice or by some other member on his behalf, when it comes on in due course, it shall, unless postponed by leave (f the Council, be considered as dropped, and shall not be moved without fresh notice.
4. No motion to rescind any resolution which has been passed within the preceding six months, nor any motion to the same effect as any motion which has been negatived within the preceding six months,
shall be in order, unless the notice thereof shall have been given and specified in the summons, and the notice shall bear, in addition to the name of the member who proposes the motion, the names of five other members; and when any such motion has been disposed of by the Council it shall not be competent for any member to propose a similar motion within a further period of six months.

This Order shall not apply to motions which are moved by the Chairman, or other member of a Committee, in pursuance of the report of the Committee.

## Order of Debate.

5. Fivery motion or amendment shall be moved and seconded, and shall be reduced to writing, and handed to the Chairman or to the Secretary to the Council, and shall be read, before it is further - discussed or put to the meeting.
6. A member of the Council shall stand when speaking, and shall address the Chair.
7. A member who speaks shall direct his speech strictly to the motion under discussion, or to a motion or amendment to be proposed by himself, or to a question of order.
8. A member shall not address the Council more than once on any motion or amendment but the mover of an original resolution may reply, and in his reply shall strietly confine himself to auswering previous speakers, and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate, Provided always, that a member may speak to a point of order, or in explanation of some material part of a specch made by him which he believes to have been misunderstood.
9. A motion or amendment once made and seconded shall not be withdrawn without the consent of the Council,
10. Every amendment shall be relevant to the motion on which it is moved.
11. Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of ; but notice of any number oc amendments may be given.
12. An amendment shall be either-
[a.] To leave nut words :
[b.] To leave out words and insert or add others:
[c.] To insert or add words.
13. If an amendment be rejected, other amendments may be moved on the original motion.

If an amendment be carried, the motion as amenderl shall take the place of the original motion, and shall become the question upon which any further ameniment may be moved.
14. Any member of the Council who, in the opinion of the Chairman, transgresses any standing order, or refuses to obey the ruling of the Chairman, may be called upon to resume his seat by the Chair$\mathrm{m}: \mathrm{in}$ If he persists in his refusal to obey the ruling of the chair, the Chairman, upon the motion of any member of the Council, may suspend him during the remainder of the sitting.

## Applications by County Council under Procedure Rules.

15. A copy of every notice of motion of an application made by a member of the Council under Article 7 of the Local Government (Procedure of Councils) Order, 1899, if made more than thirty days before any quarterly meeting of the Council, shall Le transmitted by the Secretary to the Proposals Committee, and shall be deemed to have been referred to the Proposals Committee by the Council.

The Secretary to the Council shall have power to act for the Council under Article 16 (2) of the said Order, and to take such steps for publishing notice of tenders for works approved by the Proposals Committee as may be directed by the said Commitre.
16. A member moving that the Council do now adjourn, may speak for not more than five minutes. and, if the motion be seconded, it shall be seconded without a speech, and put by the Chairman without debate.
17. A member moving that the Council do now proceed to the next business, or that the debate be now adjourned, may speak for not more than five minutes, and, if the motion be seconded, it shall be seconded without a speech. The Chairman shall then call on the mover of the resolution under discussion to speak to the motion just moved, and, subject thereto, the motion shall forthwith be put to the vote.
18. A second motion that the Council do now adjourn, or that the Council do now proceed to the next business, or that the debate be $n$ ow arljoumed, shall not be made within a period of one lour, umless it be moved by the Chairman.

## Voting.

19. Every question shall be determined by a show of hands, unless five members demand a division, in which case the names for and against the motion or amendment shall be taken down in writing, and entered on the minutes.

## Commitlees.

20. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman shall exofficio be members of every committee and of every sub-committee.

## Inspection of Reports of Committees.

21. All proceedings, resolutions, and reports of every committee intended to be laid before the Council shall, unless the Committee for reasons specified in a resolution passed by them direct to the contrary, be open to the inspection of every member of the Council between the hours of ten and four in the Office of the Secretary, on the weekday previous to the meeting of the Council, at which they are to be submitted.

## Appointment of Officers.

22. Ou a vacancy occurring in any office in the appointment of the Council, the vacancy shall be notified to the Finance Committee at their next meeting, and the Committee shall inquire whether any, and what, alterations should be made in the duties and salary of the office, and shall report thereon to the Council at their next meeting.

Whenever a vacancy in any office shall ocour the Finance Committee may, if they think fit, temporarily appoint some person to carry on the duties of the office until a successor be duly appointed, and may fix the remuneration to be paid to such person.

The testimonials sent in by candidates for any appointment for which an election has been ordered shall be deposited with the Secretary to the Council, for the inspection of the members of the Council, six days at least before the day of election.

When there are more than two candidates, the names of all candidates proposed and seconded shall be put to the meeting, and each member shall vote for one candidate. If first voting does not produce an absolute majority of votes in favour of any candidate, the candidate having the least number of votes shall be struck off the list, and a fresh voting: shall take place; and so on, till an absolute majority of the members of the Council, present and voting, shall be obtained in favour of one candidate. Thereupon the election of such candidate shall be proposed by resolution.

## Common Seal.

23. The common seal of the Council shall be kept in some safe place, secured by three different locks, the keys of which shall be respectively in the keeping of two members of the Council nominated by the Council, and of the Secretary to the Council or his deputy.

Frovided that any member of the Council nominated as above may, for sufficient reas $n$, entrust his key to another member of the Council.

All deeds and other documents to which the common seal of the Council shall require to be affixed shall be sealed in pursuance of a resolution of the Council, and in the presence of the members of the Council having custody of the keys of the seal, and of the Secretary to the Council or his deputy.

> An entry of the sealing of all deeds and other
documents to which the common seal shall have been affixed shall be made by the Secretary to the Council, or his deputy, in a book to be provided for that purpose, and shall be signed by three of the members of the Council present at the sealing.

## Suspension of Standing Orders.

24. Any one or more of the standing Orders, in any case of urgency, or upon motion made on a notice duly given, may be suspended at any meeting, so far as regards any business at such meeting, provided that three-fourths of the members of the Council present and voting shall so decide.

## Interpretation.

25. Throughout these Orders, if not inconsistent with the context, the following term shall have the meaning herein-after assigned to it :-
"Chairman" shall mean the chairman of a meeting of the Council for the time being.

The walls and roof of the building were solidly and substantially constructed, and at present they present an appeatance of sturdy old age, but of course the slating, leadwork, ete, of roofs will require careful overhauling. I believe the carpentry and joinery work throughout to be on the whole in good conditionany defects in them can be remedied by repairs of the ordinay kind except a few renewals. But I think the roof timbers of the old bathroom are bad and will have to be replaced on the new A large amount of repairs in the ordinary way will be required in the line of plastering, whitewashing, painting, glazing, etc., inside and outside. Except in main corridor and ground floor all the flagging and tilling might be pronounced unfit for repair, and must be done out of the new. This brings us to renewals of old work, fittings, etc. By renewals I mean substituting new materials. articles works or apparatuses for old ones decayed or otherwise unfit or even davcer $\quad$ Renewals will be requirad in matters reletins to:-
(1) All Fire Gre 'es including Kitchen r: inge.
(2) Water supply and distribution (Hot and cold).
(3) Drainage and Sanitary Work (see also under alterations and additions).
(4) Several other miscellaneous items.

As regards alterations required they follow necessarily from the Doctors' requirements as well as from my own knowledge. In the proposed alterations I had to consider: First, that an attic, up near the slates for patients is condemned by medical men. This at once reduced the number of beds in the Infirmary to two storeys and the consequent conversion of the attic or top storey into rooms for the staff. Secondly I had to give more light for the corvidor on ground floor which even a lay person would know was wanted: Thirdly I had to provide (as well as structural matters would permit) for the Nuns: and Foutthly I had to see that Kitchens did not open directly upon the main corridor downstairs. Perhaps I should say Fifthly that I had to keep the ordinary domestic servant in mind and provide her class with a place to sleep in. Upon the plan, which I will place before you will be seen the contemplated alterations to meet above requirements. The present stacks of water closets at rear of Infirmary cannot be used for patients or off patients wards, but I see no reason against their being used with new apparatuses, etc., by the healthy in other places entirely isolated from the wards. Some sundry alterations will be required as regards windows, doors and partitíons. In the case of additions they are chiefly for Sanitary purposes. Water closets מhust be accessible from every ward, and must be intercepted from them and have cross ventilation. The fulfilment of these common Hospital requirements could not be done except from the front of the Infirmary building, and the result is that two annexes or narrow stacks will have to be built one on each side of the front entrance. Provision must be made also for ventilation. All the foregoing items refer only to the main Infirmary buildings, and do not inelude out-offices, laundry, etc. The apparatus connected with any Laundry out of use for rears must be looked upon as useless, and I believe thet a complete new Laundry installation will be re uired. Sevr-al old buildings and wa!'s in the yar ! mist be ta'ken dowr providing, of cowse. for extonal closets, ashpit. etc.

I estimate the expenditure required for reopening the Kildare Tnfirmary as a County Infirmary to be at least $£ 1.300$.

But this sum does not include Furniture, Bedding, or Surgical necessaries, neither does it include repairs to and fitting out the Old Dead House and

Post Mortem House nor sheltur for convalescent patients airing in the garden. The Infirmary at Kildare repaired, altered and azided to as propesed would have room for about 23 of: 25 beds as well as for the staff including the Nurs. I beg to attach the reports which were submitted to me by the two Doctors.

## KILDARE INFIRMARY

In estimating the cost of "putting said premises in proper repair to be opened as a County Infirmary" it will be necessary to provide for the following requirements :

## THE WARDS

The space allowed for each patient's bed should be at least 1,200 cubic feet. On the ground of the principal storey where the ceiling is ten feet high the flo ": space required for each bed should be 120 square feet.

On the second storey where the height of the ceiling is 11 feet 6 inches, the floor space allowed for each bed should be 105 square feet.

On the third storey, where one-third of the ceiling is 8 feet 2 inches high, and the other two-thirds are only 7 feet 8 inches high, there should be no sleeping wards for the patients.

There is sufficient room for 25 beds, but proper ventilation must be ensured.

## W.C.

Water closet accommodation should be provided for each ward. The closets should have thorough ventiation, and they should be disconnected from the wards by intercepting passages having also cross ventilation. The W.C. apparatus must be of approved construction and should be available for slops.

## BATHS

There should be a fixed bath in the accident ward having its foot to the wall, and at least one (movable) bath for each of the landings, besides hip and foot baths.

## HOT WATER

Hot and cold water should be supplied throughout the Hospital.

## LAVATORIES.

Lavatory accommodation should be provided for the patients of each ward, and for the sake of economy this may be inside the ward.

Each ward should have is entrance from the corridor and not through another ward. Where new ward doors are required they should be four feet wide.

## STAFF APARTMENTS

should be provided for the matron or head nurse and two other nurses. The nurses' rooms need not be beside the wards. (There are strong reasous for their being at a distance).

Sleeping accommodation would be required for say the Porter, the cook, and perhaps two or three maids.

## OPERATION ROOM

About $£ 50$ or $£ 60$ should be allowed for operation table, surgical instruments, and medical and surgical appliances.

## DRAINS.

These should be made safe and effective.
All useless walls at the back should be removed, and free circulation of air round the building should be permitted.

The ground floor corridor should be better lighted and aired.
(Note. This could be readily done by transferring the hospital entrance to the east end of the cowidor and prolonging the corridor to the window at the west end. This alteration would permit the present Matron's parlor hall, waiting room, and porter's office being converted very cheaply into a fine ward for the patients-where it is very much wantedon the ground floor).

For obvious reasons the kitchen should not open directly into the main corridor.

Ward furnishing and fitting.
Household furnishing and fitting.
Repairs and renewals.

In estimating the cost of putting the "Kildare Infirmary" "in proper repair to be opened as a County Infirmary" I am of opinion that provision should be made for the following :
(1) The overhauling of drainage system to whatever extent may be necessary to ensure the efficient ventilation and trapping of same.
(2) The substitution of closets of a moderu type for the existing ones, suitable for the reception of slops.
(3) The erection of a few external W.C's.

The following are the details of the scheme, and the Committee of Subscribers will gladly confer with any sub-Committee the County Council may appoint avil give them every information in their power.

## PROPOSED SCHEME.

(a) Free Wards to be established for the poor.
(b) One pay ward to be established.
(c) Rieligions to be apponted in charge.
(d) Provisions to be made for persons of religions other than Roman Catholic.

(4) The reconstruction of two amnexes to main building containing closets so that the latter may be separated from each ward by a narrow intercepting passage having a window or ventilator at each end. -
(5) A closet should be provided adjacent to bathroom for use of front ward on second landing.
(6) The entrance to each ward should be fitted with a door.
(7) Grates should be fixed in fireplaces.
(8) Two modern baths should be substituted for existing ones, and a lavatory basin provided in bath-room.
(9) A suitable type of modern ventilator should be substituted for ventilating grating in third storey.
(10) It would be desirable to have a couple of window, ventilators fixed in each ward.
(11) Means should be taken for the eqection of double doors or otherwise to prevent smells from kitchen from entering wards.
(12) I do not take into account repairs of roof, floors, walls, doors, boilers and range.

Burrin. Street, Carlow, 13 th November, 1900 At the request of Reverend Iohn Delaney,' and in conjunction with Dr. Bláyney, Surgeon to the Queen's County Infirmary, on yesterday I made a complete examination of the building formerly used as the Kildare County Infirmary.

It is a fine stone faced building, three stories in height, consisting of eight separate wards, and capable of accommodating forty patients.

On entering the Infirmary you find two good sized rooms on the right hand side and two rooms of corresponding size on the left. On the ground floor there are also a good "Day Room," a lavatory, a large kitchen, and a fine Store Room off Kitchen. Over this room on second storey is a large store room.
also.

On second floor there is a good bath room, with four baths, one of which is also furnished with a "shower." This room is in rather bad repair, but a small outlay would make it complete. Opposite on
same landing is a room which could be well utilised as a room for a night nurs3. On this landing one finds three fine wards; No. 2 ward, Iooking West, 40 ft . by 14 ft ., No. 3 Ward, facing front, 43 feet by 14, and No. 4 ward, looking East, 40 . feet by 14. These are all fine wards well lighted and with a good amount of cubic space.

On the third floor one finds four wards, N. .5, 6, 7 and 8. In No. 5 ward the W.C. opens immediately off the ward, and ought to be removed or altered. The other wards are good wards, but do not afford the same breathing space as wards on second landing.

I consider the building eminently suitable for a County Infirmary. The accommodation is ample. The sanitary arrangements, with a small outlay, could be made perfect, and the apartments which adjoin the main building, and are intended for the use of the Nuns, consisting of Parlor, a large room and kitchen on ground floor, and two bedrooms on second and third floors, are quite separated from building, but free communication with Hospital exists by means of a door into No. 5 ward, which would greatly facilitate the Nuns' duties.

The Laundry, yard, out-offices, sewerage and garden are well equipped, and with a small expenditure, could also be made quite perfect.

With sò many: advantages, I consider that such an Institution, when properly reformed, would prove an inestimable boon to Kildare and District, and I have no doubt would compare very favourably with the County Infirmary of Carlow, of which I have the honour to be Surgeon.

## Dear Father Delaney,

In reply to your queries just received: I am of opinion that (1) it would not be necessary to make any structural changes to receive patients, except the removal of Water Closets in No. 5 ward to a more suitable position. (2) Four top wards can be all used providing sufficient breathing space be allowed to each patient. (3) Present closet shafts if of strong iron with leaded joints can be retained
and easily remodelled. (4) Nuns can be easily -and I may add-perfectly accommodated.

I had already written my report, which I enclose ; some of these matters are referred to in it.

The Very Revd. John Delaney. Queen's County Infirmary, Maryborough, 13th Nov.

In conjunction with Dr. O'Meara, of the County Carlow Infirmary, I visited the building formerly used as a County Infirmary in Kildare on the 12th November. I was asked to express an cpinion as to the suitability of the Infirmary buildings as they now stand for the purpose of carrying on the work of a County Infirmary, and also to state how that building compared with the Queen's County Infirmary.

An infirmary to be suitable must have a suitable site. It must have accommodation for patients in the shape of wards, sanitary and hygienic appliances and some space out of doors for convalescent patients. It moreover requires to have accommodation for a nursing staff and servants and a certain number of rooms to be used for culinary operations, store-rooms, surgical appliances, compounding of medicines, laundry work, etc.

As regards the accommodation for patients. The wards are large, airy and well ventilated, and very suitably arranged for nursing purposes, and while not answering completely to the modern ideal of a hospital ward I have no hesitation in saying that they reach a very high standard, and there is nothing to prevent splendid surgical and medical work being done in them. The sanitary arrangements too, while at present perhaps slightly defective, could with a small expenditure be brovght up to a very efficient standard and there is an excellent bath-room in a suitable position.

I have no hesitation in saying there is ample accommodation for patients.

The apartments set apart for the accommodation for nurses and nuns are also extremely suitable.

In the annexe attached to the buildings there is proviacd all the privacy which is required for conveniual purposes, while at the same time the nuns are in close proximity with the patients and can excrise thorough supervision over them at all times. Thefe are moreover apartments suitable for a trained nurse opening off the main entrance, and in a Idition on the second landing a nure's room from which with little trouble all the wards can be kept under surveillance, and the wants of the patients attended to. The apartments for servants, kitchen, store-rooms, pharmacy, etc., are also suitable for the purpcse, and out of doors there is a very fine laundry with every accommodation. The apartments set apart for outdoor patients seem to be very suitable, and there is ample exercise ground for patients.

To sum up in my opinion the building as it at piesent stands on a suitable airy site, is just what is required for hospital accommodation, and I am only supprised to find it so long idlu. While in all respeces it may not at present compete with the Queen's Comny Inlirmary, upon the whole the plan of the Luilding is more suited to hospital work than the Queen's County Infirmary. Inasmuch as the Qucen's County Infirmary has been in constant use, ceriain advances have been from time to time made as tho necessities of modern ideas of hospital treatment demanded. However, thare is absolutely no reason to my mind why the Kildare Infirmary buildings as they as present stand could not be used for l:ospital purposes. It is true that the top wards are not so high as modern sanitarians would recommend. But ly putting a less numbar of patients in pioportion to its length and breadth than in the wards of the lower corridor this difficulty is easily overcome, and at $:$ iough calculation a hospital to accomodate Thety to foriy or even more paicnts is waiting to be eqreed.

The closet shafts do not answer medern ideas on the subject. but by the adoption of a more modern pattern of closet, and introducing proper ventilating apparatus, they will answer the purposes in a very satisfactory if not absolutely proper manner. Then, its regards the nursing department, there is, as I have already sa d a. most suitable suite of apartments for the accomimodation of nuns, if it be the intontion to introduce nuns, and I understand it is.

In fact when the building is put into working wder I icel sure that t w. It compere favouably with any County Infirmary in Ireland. It seems to me to prosess very gieat facilities for the successful treatneent of pat:ents, and I am confident that when Kildare the va ue of which they will appreciate the re-opened it will prove a 1 oom to the pecple of Comuty more highly the longer it continues to do the good wark of relieving suffering humanity.
