

*6.—The following shall be the subjects of examination:—(a), Irish; (b), English; (c), Arithmetic; (d), History and Geography; (e) Algebra; (f), Geometry; (g), Drawing; (h), Rural Science or Nature Study; (k), Needlework.

All Candidates must present themselves in (a), (b), (c) and (d) above. In addition candidates may present themselves in one or two but not more than two of the subjects (e), (f), (g), (h) and (k).

To be eligible for the award of a Scholarship, a candidate must pass the Examination.

In order to be regarded as having passed the examination, a candidate must secure

not less than 30 per cent. in each of the obligatory subjects—(a), Irish; (b), English; (c), Arithmetic; (d), History and Geography, and not less than 50 per cent. of the aggregate marks assigned to these subjects.

(a) Irish and English versions of the question papers will be set in each of the following subjects: Arithmetic, History, Geography, Needlework, Algebra, Geometry, Drawing, Rural Science or Nature Study, but only one version, either Irish or English, will be supplied to candidates.

Candidates will be required to indicate on their application forms which version they desire to take, but they will not be obliged to adhere to the preference indicated.

(b) Candidates who answer all the questions in any subject wholly in Irish from the Irish version of the paper will get a bonus of not more than 10 per cent. except in Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Needlework and Drawing, in which the bonus will not be more than 5 per cent.

No bonus will be awarded to a Candidate who answers in Irish from the English version of the paper.

For the purpose of placing in order of merit those candidates who pass the examination, the total marks obtained by each candidate in the four obligatory subjects will be reckoned, and, in addition the total marks obtained by him (or her) in any optional subject (not exceeding two in number) in which he (or she) obtains at least 20 per cent. of the maximum marks assigned to that subject.

7—Each student at the end of each Academic Year must renew application for his or her Scholarship. Application must be accompanied by a report of satisfactory progress and conduct from the School Authority and the County Council and the Minister for Education reserve the right of withholding the Scholarship in the second or any succeeding year if report for the previous year on the student is unsatisfactory. Scholar who does not pass with honours the Department's Intermediate Certificate Examination at or before the end of his/her third year shall not, as a rule, be eligible for a further renewal of his/her Scholarship.

8—The County Council shall hold a meeting in the month of August, or as soon as convenient after receiving results of Examination, and award the Scholarships, and the right is reserved to the Council to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship, subject to the approval of the Department of Education. Subject to the same authority the decision of the Council on all questions relating to Scholarships shall be conclusive and final.

APPENDIX

PROGRAMME.

SYLLABUS OF EXAMINATION.

In all subjects the programme of the Examination for Scholarships in the Secondary and Vocational Schools is the programme prescribed for Standard VI. pupils in the Official Programme for National Schools subject to such alterations therein as are set out in the revised programme of Primary Instruction issued in September, 1934, and to such further modifications as are mentioned below:—

OBLIGATORY SUBJECTS.

(a) Irish. (300 Marks).

ORAL. (150 Marks).

- (1) General Conversation.
- (2) Reading, with explanation.
- (3) Recitation, with explanation of 100 lines of poetry.

- (1) Composition and letter writing.
 - (2) Suitable exercises in Grammar.
- N.B.—There will be no Oral test in English.

(c) Arithmetic. (200 Marks).

(d) History and Geography. (200 Marks).

HISTORY.
(100 Marks).
GEOGRAPHY.
(100 Marks).

Optional Subjects — Any two, but not

more than two, may be taken by Candidates.

- (e) Algebra. (100 Marks).
- (f) Geometry. (100 Marks).
- (g) Drawing. (100 Marks).
- (h) Rural Science or Nature Study. (100 Marks*).

See Note 2 below.

(k) Needlework. (100 Marks).

The programme for the examination is the revised programme in Needlework issued to National Schools in October, 1937.

All candidates must present themselves for examination in (a), (b), (c), and (d) above. In addition, candidates may present themselves in one or two, but not more than two, of the subjects (e) to (k) inclusive.

Note 1.—The arrangement set out in the Department's circular Iml. 9/37 (issued in September, 1937 relative to the scheme for the collection and preservation of Folklore and Oral Tradition) providing that alternative questions bearing on the work done under the revised programme for the subjects, Irish and English, therein indicated, would be set on the question papers, will apply also to the examination for 1940.

Note 2.—Primary Schools' Programme. Syllabuses A and B Rural Science; or Syllabuses A and B Nature Study; or Syllabuses C and D Nature Study—according to type of School.

TURNINGS PLOT.

A letter, dated 6th May, 1939, was read from Mr. Osborne, enclosing Agreement with the Irish Land Commission for a plot of Land at Turnings Lower for 1/-. The Council approved of the Agreement and directed that it be Sealed.

SHEEP DIPPING.

A letter, dated 1st May, 1939, was read

from the Department of Agriculture regarding arrangements for Sheep Dipping during the coming Dipping Season and enclosing draft regulations for the guidance of the Council.

The Council approved and adopted clauses Nos. 2, 4, 7, 8 and 9 of the regulations.

Mr. Doyle proposed and Mr. Smyth seconded, and it was resolved:—

“That the Inspectors under the Warble Fly (Treatment of Cattle) Order, 1936, be appointed Inspectors under the Sheep Dipping Order, 1937, from 1st August to 31st October, 1938, at remuneration of £3 per week, subject to the sanction of the Department of Agriculture, and that Miss Eileen Slatter's services be retained from 1st October to 7th November, 1939, at £2 per week.”

DYE IN SHEEP DIP.

A letter, dated 29th March, 1939, was read from the Department of Agriculture regarding Sheep Dips that contain material of the nature of a dye which cannot be washed out of the wool, and suggesting that the Council should get a guarantee from the suppliers that the dip is free from colouring matter which cannot be readily washed out from the wool.

The Council approved of the suggestion and directed that Messrs. Osmonds be requested to give the required guarantee in respect of all dip supplied by them.

Referring to my letter of the 23rd ult., in which I advised that the Council should not complete the purchase herein owing to a defective title, I have now heard from Messrs. Brown & McCann who make the suggestion that the first Mortgagee could convey the plot to the Council.

With regard to this suggestion the following would be the position:—

(1) The Council to purchase Mr. Corbally's interest for £85.

(2) The Council would have to purchase the rent of £10 reserved in the Lease to the Landlord, Mrs. Susan Young, who, I understand, is asking 16 years' purchase, viz., £160.

(3) The consent of the Land Commission would be required to:—

(a) Sub-division of the holding of which the Weighbridge site is a portion.

(b) The apportionment of the Land Commission Annuity which effects the entire holding, including the Weighbridge site.

If the consent of the Land Commission were obtained a proportion of the annuity would be placed on the Weighbridge site, or the Land Commission might require it to be redeemed.

This is rather a round about way of carrying out the transaction and I do not know whether the Council would be in favour of it.

SHEEP DIPPING, 1939.

Sit:—

I am directed by the Minister for Agriculture to refer to your letter of the 31st ultimo bearing on proposed sheep dipping arrangements for the current year and to your discussion with Mr. W. Prendergast, Departmental Superintending Veterinary Inspector, on the 13th instant.

In connection with the matter I am to state that the Minister will not object to the re-appointment of Inspectors for the dipping period of the current year of the nine persons who were employed in that capacity last year. As regards the proposed rate of remuneration £3 per week, I am to point out that this rate was approved exceptionally for the dipping seasons of 1937 and 1938 following the introduction of the revised Sheep Dipping Order in the former season. The rate is higher than that paid for similar work by other Local Authorities and, in the Minister's opinion, is not warranted having regard to the nature and extent of the duties involved. He considers that in all the circumstances a rate of £2 per week would be adequate.

The Minister will also offer no objection to the employment of Miss Slatter, as clerical assistant, from 1st October to the 7th November next as proposed by the Local Authority.

With regard to the duties of the Sheep Dipping Inspectors it is considered advisable that these should include the visiting of Sheep Fairs and Sales in their respective areas from the 1st September to the 31st October for the purpose of inspecting Dipping Certificates which are required to accompany all sheep exposed for sale during that period. The Inspectors should report to the Council cases in which there is failure to produce such a certificate.

I am to add that the Minister approves the acceptance by the Local Authority of the estimate of £12 10s. 0d. for the purpose of providing new gates and effecting sundry repairs to the Dipping Station at Ballymany as indicated in your letter of the 7th instant.

I am directed by the Minister for Agriculture to state that in the course of a report made by a Departmental Veterinary Inspector on 13th instant, regarding the work of temporary Inspector John Traynor, it is stated that 32 cattle, the property of Mr. Peter Mackay, Lacken, Blessington, which were grazing on the farm of Mrs. Jackson, Kill, for the past three months had not been dressed this year although some of them were infested with warbles. It is also stated that the only action taken by the temporary Inspector in the matter was to request Mr. Jackson to inform Mr. Mackey, the owner, that he would have to dress his cattle, and that the Departmental Inspector instructed Mr. Traynor to serve a Detention Notice.

The Minister will be glad to be informed if such Notice was served, if the cattle have since been dressed, and, if not, whether the question of legal proceedings against Mr. Mackey has been considered.

A Chara :—

I have the honour to report that I have audited the Accounts of the Kildare County Council, including the County Library Committee, for the three half-years ended 30th September, 1938. Certified copies of the Abstracts of Accounts and Secretary's Statements are forwarded herewith.

The rates levied for the three years ended 31st March, 1939, were at the following rates in the £ :—

The increase in the rate levied for Eoads was necessitated by an increase in the amount provided for County roads under the headings, Repair and Improvement, and also for employment schemes. Increased provision was made in County Services for the Mental Hospitals, Committee of Agriculture, Vocational Education Committee and Primary and Secondary Scholarships.

The rates levied for Poor Relief and Board of Health Charges vary from year to year in accordance with the Demand of the Board of Health and Public Assistance. Separate Charges varied from one penny to twenty-two pence in the £.

Rates on agricultural land were abated by the appropriate rates in the £ in respect of the Council's share in the Agricultural Grant.

The transactions on the Revenue Account for the three half-years under review, were :—

Half year ending 30th September, 1937—Receipts, £83,802 3s. 8d.; Expenditure, £120,512 14s. 1d. Half year ending 31st March, 1938 :—Receipts, £154,094 6s. 4d.; Expenditure, £105,555 18s. 0d. Half year ending 30th September, 1938 :—Receipts, £91,430 15s. 11d.; Expenditure, £124,137 7s. 9d.

The debit balance on 30th September, 1938, amounted to £33,312 4s. 3d.

The state of the rate collection continues to be most unsatisfactory. Arrears

of rates outstanding on 31st March, 1938, totalled £43,407 12s. 2d., as compared with £39,090 5s. 6d. on 31st March, 1937. It is to be noted that the percentage outstanding was higher than that in any other County, with one exception.

I desire to draw the particular attention of the Council to the unsatisfactory position in the following districts :—

District No. 1.

The amount carried forward from the 1936/37 warrant was £1,692, whereas for the subsequent year these arrears had increased to £1,894. The first moiety of the 1938/39 warrant was not closed until 30th January, 1939. This collector is far from satisfactory and the Council should call upon him for an immediate improvement.

District No. 3.

The arrears carried forward increased from £973 for the year 1936/37 to £1,099 for the year ended 31st March, 1938. An improvement is called for in this district.

District No. 4.

The arrears in this district increased from £1,100 to £1,278.

District No. 6.

The arrears carried forward increased from £1,374 to £1,718. The percentage of the warrant carried forward from the 1936/37 warrant was 13.9%. This figure has risen to 15.4% of the warrant for the year ended 31st March, 1938. There is need for considerable improvement in this district.

District No. 9 Collector J. Kelly.

The position in this district has deteriorated to a serious extent within the past twelve months. The arrears carried forward from the 1936/37 warrant amounted to £1,599 while the amount carried forward from the warrant for 1937/38 was £3,123. This represents an increase of almost 100%. The first moiety of the 1938/39 warrant was not closed until 16th February, 1939, while at the date of audit a sum of £5,411 remained outstanding out of a total warrant of £13,619 for the year 1938/39.

The Collector informed me that he was unable to collect the rates owing to illness and it is clear that unless an immediate improvement is effected other steps must be taken to insure the due collection of the rates in this district.

The arrears carried forward for subsequent collection from the warrants for the year 1937/38 were also increased,

as compared with the previous year in districts Nos. 10, 12 and 13.

The drainage rate collection is in a lamentable condition. It would appear that in most of the drainage districts no effort is made to collect the rate. The position for the years 1936/37, 1937/38, was as follows :—

I was unable to find that the Council took any measures to improve the position. Collector Kelly, whose unsatisfactory Poor Rate Collection has been referred to, is responsible for the collection in most of the drainage districts.

Rates amounting to £7 15s. 6d., which I considered should have been collected, appeared upon the lists of arrears of irrecoverable rates. This sum was lodged during audit and a formal disallowance was therefore rendered unnecessary.

Loans, amounting to £40, which were advanced under the Small Dwellings (Acquisition) Acts were repaid in excess of the normal repayments during the period under review. This sum which was lodged to the credit of the Revenue Account should now be transferred to the Small Dwellings Capital Account.

A fee of £1 is paid to the Engineer in respect of each house inspected. This fee is not recovered from the applicant. Furthermore, several applications for loans were withdrawn for the reason that the Council's legal adviser was not satisfied as to the applicant's title. In these cases legal costs were borne by the Council.

It is the duty of the Council to ensure that no loss falls upon it arising out of these transactions and in future applicants should be required to lodge a deposit sufficient to cover Engineer's fees and legal costs. Where legal costs are recovered by the Council's solicitor from the applicant, the deposit can be refunded.

The new bridge at Droichead Nua was completed during the period under review. The final cost of the contract amounted to £17,463, as compared with £14,816 which was the contract price. The County Surveyor informed me that the increase was due to the high cost of constructing the approaches for which a sum of £100 had been provided by the Consulting Engineer.

The Insurances were in force and the bonds of the officers who are required to give bond, were in order at the date of audit.

The accounts were presented for audit in a satisfactory manner.

(4) Work shall not be put in hands until a letter approving of the proposed schemes has been received.

(5) The detailed particulars required on the revised Form O.D. 5 must be furnished (**obsolete forms O.D. 5 should not be used**).

(6) The periodical returns of employment and expenditure on the works shall be furnished punctually on the prescribed forms.

(7) The works are to be completed prior to the 31st March, 1940.

(8) Particulars of the works proposed to be undertaken must be lodged with the Department not later than 15th proximo.

Accordingly, I am to request that you will arrange immediately for the submission on the relevant forms, of a scheme providing for a gross expenditure of £1,450.

SPECIAL ROAD FUND GRANT.

“With reference to previous correspondence regarding the making of special grants from the Road Fund for the improvement of certain county roads, I am directed by the Minister for Local Government and Public Health to state that in certain circumstances grants are made available on a contributory basis for the improvement of county roads on which motor traffic is sufficiently heavy to justify assistance from the Road Fund.

Of the proposals submitted only Nos. 1, 6 and 7 appear to be works in respect of which a contribution from the Road Fund could be justified. No. 5 might

be considered if the improvement of the whole distance between T.5 and L.25 were to be undertaken, but this would need to be deferred until the Poulaphouca Scheme has been completed.

Detailed proposals in regard to the works indicated above should be submitted for consideration in due course.”

In connection with the foregoing, the following letter, dated 27th July, 1939, was read from the County Surveyor:—

“In reference to the Department's letter of the 11th inst., sub-joined below is a revised scheme as requested by them for more continuous road lengths than previously submitted. The map enclosed gives a comprehensive view of these. This includes the resurfacing of the whole of the bus route which we complained of, viz., Portarlinton-Rathangan and Kilmeague. On hearing again from the Department if they now approve I will prepare and submit the usual estimate.”

GENERAL ESTIMATE.

Widening and resurfacing P.I. Nos. 237, 245, 138, 155, 117, 169, and 188. Total, 15 $\frac{3}{4}$ miles—£11,000.

As the scheme would probably proceed during the next financial year as well as the present, it would be necessary to find a portion of the Council's contribution, say a half or approximately £2,800 in the Road Works Scheme for the present financial year. J. R.

The restoration of the Rathmore-Eades-town road is now nearing completion; in this connection I have to report that the contractors for the portion of the Poulaphouca Water Scheme causing a large part of the extra traffic have, as a result of negotiations, made us an offer of £300 to cover their liability, and your Finance Committee recommend this be accepted. The position brought about by sand lorries using

certain other bye-roads, notably the Woolpack road, has not been yet settled and if the lorry owners do not offer to contribute specially to the cost of road repair the Council might apply for an order limiting the weight of vehicles: even if this reduces the trade in sand.

As mentioned at your meeting on 28th July, I am still negotiating with the Roads Department regarding special grants for certain county roads, notably those that comprise the passenger bus route through Brackna, Portarlington and Kilmeague.
