The Pleasure is All Mine with the Dennis O'Driscoll Awards

Saturday, 30 September / 11am / McAuley Place, Naas

The poet **Dennis O'Driscoll**, who died on Christmas Eve 2012, is still a much-missed force on the Irish and international poetry scene. In this talk, poet **Enda Wyley**, who knew Dennis and admired his poetry, will discuss the compassionate, knowing, quietly charismatic and often funny attributes of O'Driscoll's work, most poignantly present in his final collection of poetry, Dear Life, which includes the poem 'Memoir,' from which the title of this talk is taken. 'Now my/ whole life/ lies ahead/ of you. / No thanks/ at all are/ called for, / I assure you./ The pleasure/ is all mine.'

We will also present the prestigious **Dennis O'Driscoll Literary Bursary Awards** to this year's awardees **Ed O'Loughlin** (Established Writer) and **Eva Griffin** (Emerging Writer) who will discuss what this award will mean to their practice and read their work.

This year's awards were adjudicated by Writer in Residence 2022/2023 with Maynooth University/Kildare Library and Arts Services, **Catherine Talbot**.

This is Not About You Online Book Club with Rosemary Mac Cabe

Kildare author, podcaster and internet personality **Rosemary Mac Cabe** will be chatting with journalist **Roe McDermott** about her #1 Irish bestseller debut *This Is Not About You: A Menmoir*, a "life story in a series of love stories". Absent Friend John MacKenna

Tuesday, 3 October / 7pm / Athy Community Library

Absent Friend is a book about a thirty-year friendship between singer/songwriter Leonard Cohen and Irish writer John MacKenna. The book examines the roots of that friendship, which began with a first hearing of Cohen's work when MacKenna was recovering from meningitis in his late teens. Fifteen years later the pair would meet for the first time and establish a friendship that lasted until Cohen's death in 2016 and included their working together in Cohen's last months on the requiem Between Your love and Mine.

This event, as part of Kildare Readers' Festival, has MacKenna reading from the book and talking about the friendship, while singer Katie Jacques will perform some of Leonard Cohen's songs. Katie Jacques is a singer/songwriter who graduated from Cork School of Music last year. She was one of the lead singers in Between Your Love and Mine.

Katherine O'Donnell (*Slant*) and Declan Toohey (*Perpetual Comedown*) discuss and read from their debut novels which were published this year and add to the growing canon of queer Irish literature.

Slant by Katherine O'Donnell is a ground-breaking Irish lesbian love story, set across the decades from the 1980s AIDS crisis to the 2015 marriage referendum. Katherine O'Donnell's debut delivers a headbutt to the heart that reveals and celebrates all the kinds of love needed to sustain a life.

Perpetual Comedown is the debut novel from an unforgettable new voice in Irish fiction. In breathless prose, Declan Toohey weaves a contemporary yarn of academic intrigue and youthful irreverence, sexual fluidity and neurodiversity. Experimental, trippy, hilarious, compassionate, Perpetual Comedown is a riotous reckoning in the construction of the self.

Book Launch with Maria McDonald

Jane Best and Agnes Williams are known in Belfast for taking in lodgers at Riverdale House, the business they started together after losing their husbands in the Anglo-Zulu War. For forty years, they've welcomed young women in need of a respectable place to stay in the city—including unfortunate cases like young Iris Seoin, who's come here to get away from her abuser.

When a man shows up at the lodging house looking for Iris, he experiences a flash of recognition. He knows these two. He knows their past. And he knows what they're hiding.

For Jane and Agnes, everything is at stake. But if they succeed in burying this blackmailer, will their secret stay buried with him?

Poor: Grit, courage, and the life-changing value of self-belief

Join **Katriona O'Sullivan** for a discussion on Katriona's book *Poor. Poor* is a memoir describing the impact of childhood poverty. Katriona's story recounts her journey from poverty, teenage pregnancy, homelessness to graduating with a PhD from Trinity College Dublin and becoming an award-winning lecturer whose work challenges

barriers to education. *Poor* is her stirring argument for the importance of giving hope, practical support and meaningful opportunities to children.

Sunday Morning Session: Judith Mok & Michael O'Loughlin in conversation with Dermot Bolger

Writer and soprano, **Judith Mok** was born in Holland and studied at the Royal Conservatory of the Hague. She has toured the world as a classical soprano, moving to Dublin in 2002, where she is a leading voice coach working with noted singers from the classical and pop worlds. Her books include the novels *De Beul* (2000) and *Gael* (2006), and her extraordinary memoir, *The State of Dark*, (2022). *The State of Dark* is a moving, beautifully written memoir of a Second-Generation survivor, as the Holocaust continues to be a living presence in European life and culture. She is married to the writer Michael O'Loughlin.

Poet, translator, critic, screenwriter and commentator, **Michael O'Loughlin** was born in Dublin in 1958. His poetry

collections include Stalingrad: The Street Dictionary (1980), Another Nation (1996), In This Life (2011), Poems 1980-2015 (2017) and Liberty Hall (2021). He has lived in Barcelona (where he first met his wife, writer and soprano Judith Mok); in Amsterdam and, since 2002, has lived in Dublin. From the youthful collections which ushered in a new urban aesthetic in Irish poetry, to his later explorations of European history and identity, O'Loughlin has earned a reputation as one of Ireland's most important poets, whose work has an exceptionally strong international outlook and a fierce dedication to social and historical justice.
