Author of Make, Bake, Love and Dream Deli in conversation with Hazel Williams

Food writer Lilly Higgins lives in Cobh, Co.Cork with her partner Colm and two small sons. Author of *Dream Deli* and *Make Bake Love* both published by Gill & MacMillan, Lilly writes regularly for newspapers and magazines. Having graduated from Ballymaloe Cookery School with a 12 week diploma Lilly went on to teach at the school. Finally, using her degree in design, as well as her love of baking and cooking, Lilly started a food blog in 2010. This has led to a career in food writing, styling and photography as well as a year spent running an underground supper club in Dublin. Lilly is also a judge and presenter of 'Ireland's Best Young Baker' on RTE2 this Autumn.



10 Books You Should Read

Mary Shine Thompson and Peter Sheridan

Sat Oct 12th | 10.00-11.30 | Riverbank Arts Centre

Mary Shine Thompson is a regular reviewer of fiction for the national press and has published widely, especially on poetry and children's lilterature. She is former Dean of Research and Humanities at Dublin City University (St Patrick's College), former chair of Poetry Ireland, the national poetry organisation, and of Imram, the Irish-language literary festival, and a one-time English lecturer. Among her edited publications are Young Irelands: Studies in Children's Literature; The Fire i' the Flint: Essays on the Creative Imagination; Skellig Sunset, by Michael Kirby (2006); and Selected Plays by Austin Clarke.

Peter Sheridan is an award-winning writer and director. Winner of the Rooney Prize for Literature, he was Writer-in-Residence at the Abbey Theatre, and with his brother, Jim, founded the Project Theatre Company. His publishing credits include 44: A Dublin Memoir and Forty-Seven Roses, both based on his family. His first novel, Big Fat Love was published in 2003 and this year, another memoir, Break a Leg was published. He is also an accomplished playwright and director of many and varied theatre productions such as The Risen People, The Shawshank Redemption (Director) and the hugely successful Dancing Shoes – the George Best Story. His film credits include Prix Art Europe and Banff Winning Short The Breakfast, and the feature film, Borstal Boy.

Niamh Boyce, Caroline Finnerty and Louise Phillips in conversation with John Boland

Writers, Talking! John Boland, in conversation with authors Niamh Boyce, Caroline Finnerty and Louise Phillips, chatting about their work, preferred genres and influences.

John Boland is Dublin-born and has worked in journalism all his adult life. He was a theatre and film critic with the Irish Press, literary columnist for the Irish Times and is currently television critic and books critic for the Irish Independent. He also contributes regularly to RTE's Sunday Miscellany on literary, musical and arts topics and has won an Arts Journalist of the Year award. His first book of poems, *Brow Head*, was published in 1999.

Niamh, from Kildare, is the author of *The Herbalist (2013)*. She has won the Hennessy XO New Irish Writer Award, and her short fiction has been nominated for the Francis Mac Manus Competition, the Molly Keane Creative Writing Award and the New Irish Writing Award.

Caroline, from Kildare, is the author of novels *In a Moment* and *The Last Goodbye* (2013). Short-listed for the RTE Guide/Penguin Short Story Award, she has just compiled *If I was a Child Again*, a collection of stories sold in aid of Barnardos.

Louise, from Dublin, is the author of *Red Ribbons*, shortlisted for Best Irish Crime Novel of the Year (2012) and *The Doll's House (2013)*. Short-listed for the Molly Keane Memorial Award, she has won the Jonathan Swift Award and was also a winner in the Irish Writers' Centre Lonely Voice Platform.









Just Mary

An afternoon with Mary O'Rourke

Mary O'Rourke is a former deputy leader of Fianna Fáil, who has held a number of senior Cabinet positions. She has also been Leader of the Seanad and is a frequent guest on radio and television.

Mary is known as someone who always speaks her mind. This forthright approach has made her one of Ireland's best-loved public figures and is very much in evidence in her highly popular memoir, *Just Mary*.



Brian McGilloway & Declan Hughes in conversation with Declan Burke

A stellar line-up of the finest crime writers will have a panel discussion led by Declan Burke who has published four novels: Eightball Boogie, The Big O, Absolute Zero Cool and Slaughter's Hound. Declan is also the editor of Down These Green Streets: Irish Crime Writing in the 21st Century, and the co-editor, with John Connolly, of Books to Die For, which won this year's Agatha Award for Best Non-Fiction.

Brian McGilloway was born in Derry in 1974 and is currently Head of English in St Columb's College in the city. His *Inspector Devlin* novels have been shortlisted for a CWA Dagger, Irish Book Award and the Theakston's Old Peculier Crime Novel of the Year while *Little Girl Lost*, which introduced a new series featuring DS Lucy Black, won the University of Ulster's McCrea Award in 2011 and was a No.1 e-book bestseller, selling over a quarter of a million copies. The new Lucy Black novel *Hurt* will be published in November.

Declan Hughes has written five novels *The Wrong Kind of Blood, The Colour of Blood, The Dying Breed, All The Dead Voices* and *City of Lost Girls.* His new novel *All The Things You Are* will be published in 2014. Declan is also the co-founder and former artistic director of Rough Magic Theatre Company. His plays include *Digging For Fire, Twenty Grand, Shiver* and *The Last Summer*.







James Durney

The War of Independence in Kildare

James Durney, author of the recently published *The War of Independence in Kildare*, will conduct an illustrated talk on County Kildare in the decade of revolution. As part of KRF 2013, James is compiling a list of participants in County Kildare's decade of revolution, 1913-1923. The aim of this project is to publish in 2016, a biographical account of all Kildare participants in this revolutionary period to coincide with the anniversary of the 1916 Rising.

Did your Kildare relative participate in The 1913 Lockout, The 1916 Rising, The War of Independence or The Civil War? If so, this project presents an opportunity to include a permanent record of their part in this publication. Pádraig Yeates is author of Lockout: Dublin 1913. He is former Industry and Employment Correspondent of the Irish Times. Other books include: A City in Wartime: Dublin 1914-1918 and A City in Turmoil: Dublin 1919-1921.

Mary P. Corcoran is Professor of Sociology at the National University of Ireland Maynooth, where she is also a research associate at the National Institute for Regional and Spatial Analysis, and a member of the University's Governing Authority. Author of numerous scholarly articles and reports, Mary was a Taoiseach's nominee to the National Economic and Social Forum. She occasionally appears as a commentator on radio and television.

Angela Harding trained as an actress at The Abbey Theatre and has worked in theatre for many years. Her TV career includes roles in RTE's Wanderly Wagon and Glenroe. Angela worked with the BBC playing Nora in The Plough & The Stars and Maggie in My Son My Son. She worked as a continuity announcer on RTE Radio1 and now works with the Drama Department. She is delighted that the series Strumpet City, in which she plays the role of Mary, is being revisited as part of the 1913 Lockout commemorations.

Dermot Bolger's intimate and relaxed Sunday morning interviews with leading Irish authors are a Festival highlight.

Jennifer Johnston, one of the foremost Irish writers of her generation has won the Whitbread Prize and the Evening Standard Best First Novel Award. She has been shortlisted for the Booker Prize with Shadows on our Skin. Her first book, The Captains and the Kings, appeared in 1972. Her other novels include Truth or Fiction, Foolish Mortals, The Gingerbread Woman, Two Moons and Shadowstory.

Dermot Bolger's novels include A Second Life: A Renewed Novel, New Town Soul and the novella, The Fall of Ireland. His play, The Lament for Arthur Cleary, received the Samuel Beckett. His ninth collection of poems, The Venice Suite: A Voyage Through Loss, was published recently. In 2012, Bolger was named Commentator of the Year at the Irish Newspaper Awards.
