John Minihan, born in 1946, was raised in Athy, County Kildare. His early passion for photography led him at 12 years old, to move to London to work as an apprentice photographer with the Daily Mail. His talent and dedication led him to become the youngest staff photographer for the Evening Standard at the age of 21 where had the opportunity to photograph numerous iconic figures.



One of his most famous photographs is of a 19-year-old Lady Diana Spencer. Among other famous personalities he photographed were author Edna O'Brien and renowned playwright Samuel Beckett. These photographs demonstrate his ability to capture the essence and personality of his subjects in a natural and authentic way.



Caws of Alarm 2016, Little Stories, Little Prints Woodblock Print 22 x 23 cm

This print representing the city of Dublin in the 1916 Rising was inspired by lines from a poem written by Thomas Merton, "Caws of Alarm And in the end of all, Crows will come back and sing the funeral."

Wharfdale Set in Proclamation Type 2016, Little Stories, Little Prints Linocut 20 x 20 cm

The 1916 Proclamation was printed on a Wharfedale printing press in Liberty Hall, which was said to be a temperamental machine that required constant attention. The challenge of printing the proclamation was compounded by having limited characters to work with. In this linocut, we see the press constructed with type characters from the proclamation.

Eugene Prepares for the Big Day 2016, Little Stories, Little Prints Etching 16 x 16 cm

Eugene Porter was the grandfather of the artist's wife. He was about 19 years old when he fought on the streets of Dublin during the Rising. This print shows a young man, pensive and measured in preparation for a momentous occasion.

Fireworks, Easter Monday 1916, Version 1 2016, Little Stories, Little Prints **Toned Cyanotype** 20 x 20 cm

During looting that took place on Sackville Street at Easter 1916, the most targeted shops appear to have been Noblett's sweet shop and Lawrence's toy shop. Among the toys that were looted from Lawrence's was an amount of fireworks which were set off by the children on the street outside, adding to the chaotic scenes around them.

Dublin artist Michael Ashur studied at the National College of Art and Design. His paintings, characterised by their large scale, highly technical composition and striking use of colour are influenced by scientific research and discovery.

The solar system and celestial objects were a significant source of inspiration for him, "The infinity of the universe is like looking into the infinity of the human mind." Michael Ashur, 1991.

His artworks are included in the collections of the Irish Museum of Modern Art, the Hugh Lane Gallery, The Arts Council | An Chomhairle Ealaíon and UCD.







CONSTANCE SHORT

Cailíní na hÉireann 2016, Little Stories, Little Prints Lino Cut Print 15 x 13 cm

During the Easter Rising of 1916, women wore nurse's uniforms in order to move freely throughout the city, feeding the soldiers, tending the wounded and carrying messages and ammunition between the Irish garrisons. Only women officers, who tended to come from the upper classes, were allowed use guns. The 'regular' women volunteers, were referred to often as cailíni, instead of mná.



MARGARET TUFFY

Dawn, Ode to Bridget McKane 2016, Little Stories, Little Prints Mezzotint 12 x 10 cm

Bridget McKane was one of 38 children who lost their lives in the 1916 Rising. Under fire from the British soldiers, the rebels sought shelter where they could, forcing their way into 10, Henry Place, by shooting the lock off the door. Thomas McKane and his 16 year old daughter, Bridget, were standing behind the door. Thomas was injured in the hand and Bridget took a bullet in the head and died shortly afterwards.

From Kells, County Meath, Micheal Farrell became an internationally recognised Irish artist. He studied at St Martin's College of Art, London in the late 1950s and was based in France from 1971. His work was concerned with issues surrounding Irish identity, culture, history and politics being especially impacted by the escalating violence in the North. He has received a number of awards internationally, and was elected a member of Aosdána in 1987. His work is included in important collections both in Ireland and abroad, for example the Irish Museum of Modern Art, the Hugh Lane Gallery, the Ulster Museum, the City Museum of Manchester Art Gallery, and the Pompidou Centre and Musée d'Art Modern in Paris.
